Portland, July 26.—Grain dealers think the price of new crop oats will be kept pretty well up in the Northwest this year on account of the damage done to the oat crop of the Columbia basin by the recent hot winds.

The damage to spring wheat also proves considerable as the reports from various grain districts east of the mountains comes in.

A large proportion of the eggs now coming in are "seconds" and "rots" after the candling process has been gone through with, and this results in loss to the shippers who have been more or less careless in packing.

The poultry market holds up well and all chickens received so far this week have been sold without much difficulty.

Large amounts of Oregon cabbage are being shipped north.

Wild blackberries are coming in from points in Columbia county. They bring 10c a pound.

A few cherries arrive daily from adjacent orchards, but the season is about over for this year.

Cooking apples are plentiful at 75¢ a box. Eating apples from California bring \$1.25 to \$1.75.
