NOW ARE PREPARED

Plans of Proposed Regatta Outlined, Committee Appointed.

RECEIVE MORE SUBSCRIPTIONS

Date For the Regatta Definitely Fixed and Sub-Committees Will Be Appointed Next Monday. Work of Committee Will Be Outlined.

The full regatta committee held an informal meeting yesterday morning at the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce. The report of the soliciting committee was received showing the total subscriptions to be about \$3,500 with at least \$500 more to come in from transportation companies and individuals and seen by the committee. The Royal Arch held a meeting and subscribed \$50, there by showing their appreciation of the efforts of the committee. Subscriptions are expected Monday from the O. R. & N. Company and other transportation companies. W. E. Schimpff tendered his resignation as a member of the committee on account of private business, and Mayor Joseph W. Supernant was appointed to the vacancy.

On motion Mayor Supernant was elected vice president of the committee. A. W. Dunbar and J. H. Seymour were appointed to secure suitable regatta headquarters. They will probably use the large room on Commercial street formerly occupied by the Commercial club.

President Wise, Secretary Johnson and Treasurer Dunbar were appointed a press committee to furnish all matter for publication in the newspapers.

The committee decided that no bill of any kind should be contracted by any member of the committee or sub-committee, or any other person, unless a requisition for the supplies needed were presented to the committee and signed by the president and secretary. The requisition must accompany the bill for supplies, which will be paid on demand. The committee to do a strictly cash business and to incur no indebtedness.

The committee met last evening and fixed the date for the regatta for Tuesday, August 29, continuing three days, being August 29, 30 and 31. The matter of incorporating was discussed and articles of incorporation were submitted and will be adopted and executed at the next meeting.

The mayor was appointed to write official letters to Senator Fulton to secure a battle ship and to Vice Consul P. L. Cherry to secure a British war vessel.

Messrs. Dunbar, Ryrie and Morse were appointed a committee to complete soliciting funds.

A committee on program to suggest regatta features was appointed, consisting of Messrs. Jellinger, Stokes and Dunbar.

Mayor Supernant was appointed a committee to select the site and build a grand stand.

CITY WILL LEASE GROUND.

The common council will shortly consider the proposition of leasing a strip of land on Commercial street adjoining Al Betts' residence and construct a small building thereon for the use of the supply department of the water commission and the street superintendent. The building will be 30x60, one story high. The O. R. & N. Company own the property and have agreed to lease it to the city for \$60 the year. When the building is erected the water commission will move their office to the new city hall building.
