Latest Quotations in the Portland Produce Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, July 28.—There was a noticeable increase in the number of chickens received yesterday resulting in a slight reduction in prices. Oregon egg shipments have fallen off the past two days owing to the hot weather and many of the eggs received are in bad shape. Fruits of all kinds are in demand and the prices continue stiff. Bran advanced 50c a ton yesterday, due to the increased demand from dairymen and the fact that several flouring mills have closed down. A car load of bananas on ice was received yesterday and met with ready sale.
