PLANS ARE WRECKED

Coal Drivers in Chicago will Continue Strike.

PEACE NOW SEEMS FAR AWAY

With Capitulation of Striking Teamsters Nearly Complete and Release of Chicago From Oppression of the Labor Struggle Assured Coal Drivers Demur.

Chicago, July 31.—With the capitulation of the striking teamsters nearly complete and the release of Chicago from the oppression of the long labor war practically assured for today, a handful of coal teamsters have wrecked the well developed peace plans.

The coal drivers, 350 strong, voted unanimously to continue the strike. As a result the Employers' Association, it is said, may close their doors to thousands of their former employees who were to have been re-engaged today. The strike era, with its police guarded wagons will also continue indefinitely.

Innumerable protests from other teamsters locals failed to shake the coal drivers in their determination.

EULOGIZE DR. HERZEL.

Boston Zionists Held Large Meeting in Memorial of Famous Advocate

Boston, July 31.—A meeting of Boston Zionists, memorial of the late Theodore Herzl, was held last night in Faneuil hall. The eulogy was delivered by Horace M. Kalleen, of Princeton University, and the orator was P. Ramantha solicitor general of Ceylon.

A cablegram announcing that by an overwhelming majority the Zionist congress at Basel defeated the Uganda proposition, was greeted with great applause. A discordant note was struck when Dr. Nissenson, of Jamaica, delivered an anti Zionist address, which was greeted with a marked demonstration of disapproval.

WHEAT FOR GUAYMAS.

Kosmos Line Steamer Carries One Thousand and Tons of Milling Products.

San Francisco, July 30.—The Kosmos steamer Theben, which sailed today for the southern coast on her way to Europe, carried 1000 tons of milling wheat for Guaymas, Mexico. For several months past the Mexican government has abolished the duty on wheat, owing to the short crop in the Hermosillo district and steamers sailing from here have received consignments of wheat sufficiently large to warrant them in calling at Guaymas, far up the Gulf of California. The duty will be imposed again on August 31.

HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

Chauffeur Loses Control of Machine in San Francisco.

San Francisco, July 31.—An automobile accident took place this afternoon in which two persons were seriously injured. While returning from a drive to the ocean beach, the machine with Mrs. Sol Camp, of Goldfield, Nev., Mrs. Baron, and Chauffeur Karl Berlin on board, got beyond control on descending a hill and overturned in the vicinity of Nineteenth avenue and H. street.

Mrs. Camp sustained innumerable contusions, and a broken rib, while Berlin, had a rib fractured and received severe internal injuries. Mrs. Baron escaped uninjured.

CONFISCATE UNIFORMS.

Olive-Drab Cloth of Soldiers Resembles Officers' Uniforms.

Benicia, Cal., July 31.—An order has just been received at the Benicia barracks announcing that all olive drab uniforms now in possession of the enlisted men must be confiscated at once. In the whole United States army there are, it is said, but three hundred of these olive drab uniforms among the men and about seventy are in the Benicia barracks. The reason for this wholesale confiscation is that the enlisted men, when dressed in these uniforms, can hardly be distinguished from the officers, and on several occasions mistakes have been made through their use.

WILL STAMP OUT FEVER.

Minister Barrett Speaks on Yellow Fever Situation on the Isthmus.

Chicago, July 31.—John Barrett, minister to Panama until a month ago and now minister to Columbia, declared last night that yellow fever will be driven out of the isthmus. He has arrived

here enroute to the Portland fair. From there he goes to his new post in Columbia.

"The general fight against yellow fever is like a great battle," he said. "Effort is being made to stamp out the disease. The people of the United States must not be impatient of the progress of the canal is slow. They must remember that the scene of operation is 2,000 miles away from the base of supplies."

EDWARD L. SHORT DEAD.

New York, July 31.—Edward Lyman Short, general solicitor for the Mutual Life Insurance company since 1895, died yesterday at his home in this city from heart failure. He had been ill since last May. Mr. Short was widely known in the legal world as a specialist in railway litigation, insurance law, taxation and corporation law, and was the author of numerous pamphlets on these subjects.

ARGUMENT CONTINUED.

Victoria, B. C., July 31.—The argument as to the admissibility of the depositions sent from San Francisco in the extradition proceedings against George D. Collins, of San Francisco, was continued this morning before Judge Lampman. Collins contending that the depositions were not properly authenticated.

TO SUE DIRECTORS

Attorney General Mayer Completes Plans for Fight

AGAINST EQUITABLE OFFICERS

Said Papers Will Be Filed in Forty-Nine Cases. Defendants Must Account for Management of Capital and Return to Society any Money Acquired.

New York, July 31.—United States Attorney General Mayer is said to have completed his plans for suing the old directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society and papers will be filed at once, possibly today, in forty-nine cases. It is understood the complaint will demand the defendants to account to the estate for their official condition, their management of the capital and the disposition made of the charge; that all of the directors will be compelled to pay to the Equitable society any moneys which they acquired by connection with the society and moneys recovered shall be credited to the policy holders in the Equitable proportion.
