Portland, Aug. 3.—Creamery butter is considered firm as a result of pastures in the dairy districts drying up. The best grades are held at 22 1/2¢ on Front street, while uptown creameries are asking 24 to 25 cents for their best butter. Cheese is also firmer from the same cause.

Considerable California produce was unloaded today from the San Francisco steamer, but not so much as usual, today, as a result of heavy receipts.

Eastern eggs are still much in evidence, and their presence keeps the price of Oregon ranch eggs down.

Some cherries are in the market from coast counties, but the season is considered over, and the demand is limited.

Veal has been marked down as a result of lack of demand.

The slump in tomatoes is over, and normal prices rule today.

Walla Walla onions are quoted at \$1.00 to \$1.10 per 100 pounds.
