YOUNG FOLKS' STYLES.

An Era of Pretty Dressing For the Coming Men and Women.

Never have children been dressed so comfortably and so daintily as now. The materials are such as can be washed many times, and the very making of the garments is simple, but there is something in the whole plan that makes them charming. Perhaps it is that uncertain age described by the poet as "standing with reluctiont feet where the brook and river meet" are made so that they are at once girlish and dainty, yet have something of the form and finish of the gowns of their mothers. Duck, pique and a whole host of other thick and washable cottons and several kinds of heavy linens, white and colored, are made into these frocks. The waists are fastened at the back, but in front are the regulation tucks and bloused shapes with the high collars and pointed belts of the elders. Skirts are made on the same lines, some with a few plaits down the breadths and others with horizontal tucks, shirrs or ruffles.

One dainty little dress for a girl of fourteen had two tucks at the edge just the width of the hem and a set of clusters of plaits on the upper part of the skirt, which gave the lower portion of the skirt a pretty flare. The blouse was tucked also in clusters which reached to the bust line. The garment was of very pale whitish blue pique, and the belt was of ribbon, which tied in the back with long ends. Cuffs and collar were of lace.

Wash Frocks.

A very neat and dainty wash frock for girls of any age from ten to sixteen was made of white swiss with coin dots. There were two wide flounces of the swiss set on a foundation of plain muslin and an upper skirt of the dotted goods. The waist was bloused. but was cut square at the throat, and had a large yoke of lace coming out well on the shoulders. The bishop sleeves reached just below the elbows and finished there with ruffles of lace. A pink sash was draped to a point in front and tied at the back in a large bow, the ends of which reached the foot of the skirt.

White dresses, white bats, made washable; pink or blue sashes, white openwork gloves make the little ones "happy is he that hath a quiver full of them." Lace bats, openwork straw hats and hats made of mull or pique are seen. The flat hats with the pretty

For very dressy wear there is a trock of dotted white mull. The skirt is made over a slip of white taffeta. At the bottom of the skirt is a deep shirring of lace heading the wrought edge. This forms a deep flounce. The waist has a bertha made of the lace, edged in turn with a ruffle of fine narnow lace. This is shirred to the neck of the waist and cut out in vandyke points. The sleeves are shirred to the elbows. This is dressy enough for a young folks.

For play there is a surprising array of little garments. There are creeping pants of Jean, overalls for tiny boys physics, civil government. and the same made with one or two are so fashioned that the dress can be tucked down into the tronsers and the child allowed to play in the sand as it wills. For the little boys from three to seven the Russian, or, as they are cology called, Buster Brown, suits are better liked than any other.

For older boys the old style gathered knee pants are seen. This is a comfortable style, and the pants do not get as much strain as the tight ones have. piece suit of coat, vest and pants. For tiny babies the present fashlon is excellent. The body is protected by a soft wool knit shirt and a bandage of the same which buttons. LIFE IN NORWAY.

Interesting Facts About the Land of

the Midnight Sun. Norway has a population of only eighteen to the square mile and is the most thinly settled country in Europe. It has a rugged, mountainous surface, just the simplicity. Freeks for girls of narrow valleys and immense barren tablelands. The people prefer a country life, are not prone to rush from the farm to the city, and are healthy and strong. About two-thirds of the entire population live upon the coast, and there are no more daring and expert sailors and fishermen in the world than the venturesome sons of the old vikings. The majority of the women are of fair complexion, with flaxen hair and blue eyes. Many of them are remarkably pretty, and they are decidedly picturesque when dressed in native costume.

There are public registry offices for servant girls, who sign a contract for six months' service. The average wage earnings of Norway are said to be only \$88 a year, and the average expense of living is less than in any
