Latest Quotations in the Portland Produce Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, Aug. 11.—Wheat exporters report dull conditions in the Portland markets, as prices have not been definitely settled upon. Wheat has been declining in the East of late, while the European markets do not seem to require much Pacific coast wheat at this time. There are no cargoes on the road to Liverpool, as prices have not yet adjusted themselves between America and England.

Scarcity still prevails in many lines, although extraordinary heavy receipts the past week.

An advance of 10 cents per 100 pounds has taken place in sugar.

Canned tomatoes are going to be scarce this year. A blight has overtaken the crop in Utah, and not over 25,000 cases will be packed this season. Utah has averaged 200,000 cases of tomatoes the past few years.

Lard is up another one half cent. This is the second advance within ten days, and quotations are considered firm.

Potatoes are coming in freely, but there is no shipping demand yet, and prices range from 60 cents to 70 cents per 100 pounds in the country.

Country butter is in light receipt, and what comes in is sold quickly at quotations.
