

# TAKES WIFE AT WORD

### Chicago Man Goes to the Lake and Drowns Himself.

## CAME HOME INTOXICATED

### Wife Said, "Go Jump in the Lake and Drown Yourself"—He Obeys and Wife Grows Hysterical on Hearing of His Insane Act.

Chicago, Aug. 12.—Joseph Garron returned home intoxicated yesterday and his wife told him to jump into the lake and drown himself. "All right," said Garron, "I'll just do that." He did, and though he was alive when taken from the water he died in the hospital two hours later. In the pocket of his coat was found this note:

"This is to certify that my wife, Maggie Garron, told me to leave the house and go to the lake and drown myself. Good-bye, and God forgive her."

Mrs. Garron became hysterical when informed of her husband's act and hurried to the hospital, but she arrived a few minutes after his death.

"I was only joking," she said as she knelt at the side of the bed where lay the body of her husband. "I never thought he would take my words seriously."

## QUARANTINES LIVESTOCK.

### Gov. Goodwin of Idaho Puts Northwest Livestock Under Ban.

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 12.—Governor Goodwin has issued a quarantine proclamation against horses, cattle and sheep from the states of Utah, Nevada, Montana, Wyoming and Oregon. The governor says in his proclamation that the state veterinary surgeon has informed him of the existence of mange and rabies among the livestock of those states and on this account that animals being driven or coming into the state in any manner subject to an inspection by either a Federal or state inspector. The governor allows of a limit of two miles inside the state boundary for all livestock, except when they have been subjected to the dipping process which excludes them from the quarantine order. Horses and cattle under harness or yoke are also excepted.

## DIAMONDS WERE LOST.

### Search Instituted for Gems in Hoboken Wharf Ruins.

New York, Aug. 12.—A diamond hunt is going on in the ruins of the Lackawanna railroad terminal at Hoboken. There was a vast quantity of baggage in the building at the time of the fire and none of it was saved. Among other things consumed was a trunk said to have contained \$15,000 worth of diamonds, owned by a wealthy New York woman.

Private detectives are watching the laborers engaged in clearing away the debris, but no trace of the diamonds has yet been discovered and the railway officials refuse to confirm the story of their loss.

## CHINESE SOLDIERS DESERTING.

Shanghai, Aug. 12.—The governor reports that the rising at Pu Chou Fu, in the province of Chansi, is purely local. Of 143 soldiers sent out, only three have returned, the remainder having probably deserted. The officials at Aai Yuan Fu are sending a large force with artillery to the scene of the disturbance.

## THREE-YEAR-OLDS WILL RACE FOR BIG PURSE.

### Second Running for Great Republic Stakes at Saratoga.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 12.—In the second and probably last running of the Great Republic \$50,000 stake here this afternoon the long-looked-for race between the great 3-year-old colts, Sysonby and Oiseau, is expected to take place. However, if the track is at all muddy, Sysonby may be scratched and James R. Keene will depend on Wild Mint in the struggle for the rich prize.

The Great Republic is not exclusively for 3-year-olds, but there has been so much discussion on the Eastern turf as to the respective merits of the English bred Keene colt and Oiseau, bred in Tennessee, that the interest in today's race centers on these two to the exclusion of Wild Mint, Broomstick Prince Hamburg and Dandelion, composing the balance of the field. Should the track be heavy Oiseau's chances will be much enhanced as the Brady colt is perfectly at home in the heavy going. Prince Hamburg will bear the Whitney colors, but the stable connections said last night they were only starting him in the hope of winning third money. Captain Brown's Broomstick is only a shadow of his former self and with 126 pounds on his back is not expected to cut much figure.

In the overnight betting Sysonby was favorite, at 1 to 2, with 4 to 1 laid against Oiseau. Liberal odds prevailed against the others, for they were considered by the layers as far outclassed. One of the greatest crowds in the history of Saratoga has arrived to witness the races today. Every hotel on Broadway is jammed to the doors and hundreds, unable to obtain rooms, spent the night on cots in the hallways.

## BETRAYED BY FRIEND.

### Chicago Woman Loses Small Fortune from Safe Deposit Box.

Chicago, Aug. 12.—Mrs. Mary Genders, a widow 21 years old, has lost \$3,000 from her safe deposit box in the Illinois Trust & Savings bank, and yesterday she swore to a warrant charging Charles C. Hamit with the theft. The money was paid her by a life insurance company after the death of her husband. Hamit, who had been friendly with the Genders, advised Mrs. Genders to put her money in the safe deposit vault until a good opportunity for investment was offered, and told her that he had better keep one of the keys as she might lose her key.

When Mrs. Genders went to the vault yesterday her money was gone.

"He is the last man in the world I would think would do such a thing," said Mrs. Genders last night. "Why, he actually knelt down and prayed at my husband's coffin." The police have traced Hamit to Cincinnati.

## MURDERERS CONVICTED.

### Wife of Count von Martini and Others Are Thrown Into Prison.

Turin, Italy, Aug. 12.—The jury has found five persons, accused of the murder of Count von Martini guilty, with extenuating circumstances. Tullio Muri, the victim's brother-in-law, and Dr. Naldi, an accomplice, were each sentenced to 30 years solitary confinement. Countess The. di Linda Bon Martini, wife of the count; Dr. Secchi, her lover, were sentenced to ten years' imprisonment, and Rosa Bonnetti, her maid, to seven and a half years.

The affair dates back to 1902, and extends over the whole of Italy, owing to political intrigues. More than 100 counsels were engaged in the trial, which lasted many months.

## SIX THOUSAND CASES.

### Steamer Santa Ana Reaches Seattle With Alaska Canned Salmon.

Seattle, Aug. 12.—Bringing 6,600 cases of canned salmon from Yakutat and Dundas canneries, 450 tons of copper ore from the Ellamar mine and 65 passengers, the steamer Santa Ana of the Northwestern Steamship company's fleet reached port from Valdez, Seward and way ports this morning by way of the inside passage.

The Santa Ana's salmon cargo was the first large shipment of this year's pack sent out of Alaska and was valued at \$20,000. Her ore cargo will be discharged at the Tacoma smelter, and is estimated as being worth \$12,000.

## BIG SALE IN BUTTE.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 12.—A special to the Miner from Helena says: M. H. Gerry, Jr., general manager of the Missouri River Power company, announced last night that the Light & Traction company property in this city and in Helena had been sold to J. G. White & Co., electrical engineers and contractors of New York. The purchase price was in the neighborhood of \$500,000. It is understood that the new owners will spend \$100,000 in improvements.
