Portland, Aug. 13.—The "bulls" aver that the new hop crop will be worth at least 25 cents a pound, while the "bears" hint at 15 cents.

Dealers say Salinas potatoes are now selling at San Francisco at 85 cents per 100 pounds and that this reduces quotations here.

Butter of the best quality continues scarce, but large quantities of second grade butter are offering.

Cheese has advanced for the same reason that butter has become scarce—the drying up of pastures on the Pacific coast.
