Portland, Aug. 17 .- Portland grain dealers, who were figuring on supplying the government with 3,000 tons of oats wanted in Manila, think Eastern firms will get the contract, as oats are cheaper in the East than here.

Wheat prices of the Northwest are gradually adjusting themselves to the market conditions of the world, according to leading exporters, who do not expect to make heavy purchases until Portland prices are more nearly on a level with those of Liverpool.

Quotations for Oregon ranch eggs have been fored down 1-2 cent as a result of Eastern competition. Oregon eggs are not coming in very freely, but the Eastket at 20 to 21 cents, while the highest price obtained for Oregon ranch eggs is Lion, \$14.75. 22 cents a dozen. Best grades of Oregon fancy creamery butter are kept up to 27 1-2 to 30 cents a pound with more or less difficulty, as the pressure from heavy importations of Eastern and Colifornia butter is very great. Home-produced butter is very scarce, but prices are by no means firm.

This ras not been a good week for poultry, as the demand has been very light. Oregon tomatoes are becoming plentiful. Peaches are still scarce, Thera are no more California peaches coming. Sweet potatoes are getting chaper and receipts heavier from day to day. Melons are plentiful on account of cool weather. Black bass are in the fish market, but the price is high-20 to 25 cents a pound. Comb honey is in market again after an absence of two weeks.

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
