## SAY VOLANT IS SAFE

Schooner Not Broken to Pieces  
in Kuskokwim River.

### MATE TELLS STRANGE STORY

Tells Mate of St. Nicholas That Volant  
Was Left in Good Condition on Beach  
in Kuskokwim River—Crew May  
Leave Today.

Schooner Volant, reported in this paper yesterday and in telegraphic dispatches of previous date, as being a total wreck in the Kuskokwim river, Alaska, if the admissions made by Mate O. Bolling of the supposedly ill-fated vessel, to Mate Oscar Antonson of the St. Nicholas, may be accepted with a degree of authenticity, is not only not wrecked, but not injured and is liable to sail serenely into this port late in the fall.

According to Mate Antonson, Bolling vouchsafed, during the voyage here from Nushagak, that aside from losing the port and starboard and a light catch anchor, the Volant was only slightly injured in the storm in Kuskokwim harbor and on making the river and being run onto the beach was in good condition. There was no pounding to pieces, no masts or rigging going by the board, and no leaks. While on the beach the cargo was discharged and sent to the mission, to which it was consigned, a short distance away. The captain, Lutgen by name, then sold the schooner, ignoring the remonstrance of Bolling, for the sum of \$125. When questioned as to the story he told Antonson, Bolling became confused and when pressed practically admitted the facts told by the mate of the St. Nicholas.

"Is it true that the Volant is not wrecked?" was asked of Bolling.

"Well, she is so so," he replied evasively.

"Is she a total wreck?"

"A total wreck is a ship all broken to pieces, isn't it?"

"Presumably."

"Well, we left her there."

"And you expect her here late in fall?"

"How did you know that?" he asked quickly, and then bit his lip, glaring at Mate Antonson who was standing near.

Bolling became confused and flustered.

"Whom do you represent?" he asked.

"A newspaper."

"Well, what do you want of me? There isn't any story about the Volant."

"There's a pretty good story when a captain sells a sound boat for \$125."

This proved too much for Bolling, and he said rather disconnectedly:

"Well, he sold her. I couldn't see my way clear to agreeing with him," indicating that he had rowed with Captain Lutgen over the deal. The Volant, it is said, was insured for \$7,000 before leaving San Francisco, and it is claimed she is not worth \$4,000. Bolling, with the four members of the crew brought here on the St. Nicholas, will try to go to San Francisco this morning on the Redondo, where they may stop the payment of the vessel's insurance.

Steamer Redondo will leave out this morning with freight and passengers for San Francisco. The boat is crowded, 15 persons being refused passage from this city.

Telegraph Beats Spencer.

Steamer Telegraph arrived down yesterday at 12:30 P. M. on her first regular run between Portland and Astoria. She carried about 40 passengers. She left Portland at 7 A. M. and on the way down the Willamette she had her first brush with the steamer Spencer and easily showed her a clean pair of heels. Captain Scott, who came down on her, is greatly encouraged by the patronage she received on her first trip. The Telegraph hereafter leaves Alder street dock, Portland, at 7 A. M., arriving here at 12:30, and returning leaves here at 2 P. M. A large crowd is expected down on her today.

Takes Hassalo's Place.

A piston head blew out and a shaft was broken on the steamer Hassalo on the up-river trip Friday, when the boat was near Rainier. She was tied up and the passengers taken to Portland on the night train. During the few weeks it will require for repairs the steamer Harvest Queen will take the Hassalo's place.
