

AN UNUSUAL CASE

Man's Heart Is On the Wrong Side.

ORGAN APPEARS NORMAL

Physicians in Operating on Patients Neck Discover That His Heart is on the Right Side Nearly Six Inches From Its Proper Place.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 21.—When Malcolm Ross, a landscape gardener, was placed on the operating table at the county hospital here today to under go an operation for the removal of a growth from his neck it was discovered by the surgeons that the left side of the body was located on the right side nearly six inches from its proper place. The organ in every way, however appeared normal. It had evidently been in that position since birth. The physicians at the hospital state that it is the first case of the kind that has ever come under their observation.

CLAIM THE RECORD FOR OATS.

McEwen Bros. of Milton Talk About 125 Bushels to the Acre.

Milton, Ore., Aug. 21.—McEwen Bros., farmers, residing about eight miles south of this city, have just harvested and threshed their oat crop, which, they say, yields an average of 100 bushels to the acre. On account of the grain being lodged badly, they say that a considerable quantity was wasted, and they believe that if all could have been saved it would have easily gone 125 bushels to the acre. This is the largest yield reported here this season. This crop was raised on bench and located near the foothills, where the soil is rich and heavy.

ROAD INSPECTORS RETURN.

Make 113 Mile Trip Over County Roads In Nehalem Valley.

County Judge Trenchard, who with Commissioner Larson and Roadmaster Fry made a tour of the Nehalem Valley for the purpose of inspecting the roads. They covered the entire section 113 miles in all, and report the need of four good bridges on the Fishhawk road and a number of smaller ones on the Elsie road and at the next meeting of the court bids will be called for their construction. They report the crops in that section to be good and the farmers prosperous, and all taking an interest in the proposed county fair.
