

PORTLAND MARKETS

Latest Quotations in the Portland Produce Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, Aug. 21.—Oregon producers and dealers cannot agree on the number of bales of hops to be raised this year in Oregon.

The hop crop of Oregon will have little effect on the markets of the world, however, as there are large quantities of hops raised in New York, England, Germany, California and Washington.

Peaches have become dearer on account of the unexpected scarcity. Southern Oregon is shipping a portion of its product to California, and this renders the scarcity more pronounced here.

A good many Oregon apples are coming in, and these sell readily at \$1.00 to \$1.50. The fruit is free from pests, as a rule, and so buyers do not expect to obtain cheap apples, as in former years.

Grain Flour, Feed, Etc. Flour—Patents, \$4.50 to \$5.10 per barrel; straight, \$4.45; clear, \$3.75 to \$4.15; Valley, \$3.90 to \$4.25; Dakota hard wheat, \$6.50 to \$7.00; Graham, \$3.50 to \$4.00; whole wheat, \$4.45 to \$4.75; rye flour, local, \$5.00; Eastern, \$5.80 to \$5.90; cornmeal, per bale, \$1.90 to \$2.20.

Butter, Eggs, Poultry, etc. Butter—City, creameries, extra creamery, 22 1/2 to 25c per pound; state creameries; fancy creamery, 20 to 22 1/2 to 24c; store butter, 15 to 16c.

Vegetables, Fruits, etc. Apples, table, \$1.50 to \$2.50 per box; cherries—7 to 12 1/2 per pound; apricots—90c to \$1 per crate.

Corn—75 to \$1. Cucumbers—\$1.50 to \$2.00 per box. Egg Plant—17 1/2 to 20c. Parsley—25c per dozen.

Groceries, Nuts, Etc. Coffee—Mocha, 26 to 28c; Java, ordinary, 18 to 22c; Costa Rica, fancy, 18 to 20c; good, 16 to 18c; ordinary, 10 to 12c per pound.

Hops, Wool, Hides, Etc. Hops—Choice, 1904, 17 to 19c per pound. Wool—Eastern Oregon, average best, 19 to 21c; lower grades down to 15c, according to shrinkage; Valley, 25 to 27c per pound.

Dressed Meats. Beef—Dressed bulls, 1 to 2c per pound; cows, 3 1/2 to 4c; country steers, 4 to 5c. Mutton—Dressed fancy, 5c per pound; ordinary, 4c.

Provisions and Canned Meats. Hams—10 to 14 pounds, 13c per pound; 14 to 16 pounds, 13 1/2 to 18 to 20 pounds, 13c; California (picnic), 9c; cottage hams, 9c; shoulders, 9c; boiled ham, 21c; boiled picnic ham, boneless, 15c.

Oil. Turpentine—Cases, 86c per gallon; barrels, 80c per gallon. White Lead—Ton lots, 7 1/2 to 500-pound lots, 7 1/2c; less than 500-pound lots, 8c.
