GOULD ELECTED PRESIDENT.

Board of Directors of Wabash Road Elects George J. Gould President. New York, Aug. 23.—George J. Gould was elected acting president of the Wabash railroad by the board of directors before he recently sailed for Europe, says the Herald. News of his election to succeed Joseph Ramsey was obtained only yesterday when it was stated that on his return, Mr. Gould will become president of the Wabash system. Mr. Gould is the present head of the Missouri Pacific, but his election to the presidency of the Wabash is not regarded as an indication that he will head all of the Gould lines. Edward T. Jeffrey will, it is understood remain president of the Denver & Rio Grande and the Western Pacific.

LIONESS ESCAPES

Causes Five Thousand People to Flee in Terror.

CHILDREN ARE TRAMPLED

Crowd Had Assembled in a Pleasure Park to See Trick Bicyclist Perform When Animal Escaped from Cage—No One Fatally Injured.

New York, Aug. 23.—A full grown lioness, which escaped from her cage in a pleasure park near Vailsburg, N. J., caused a panic last night in a crowd of 5,000 including many women and children who had gathered to watch the exhibition given by a trick bicyclist. When news of the animal's escape spread there was a wild stampede for the streets which lasted nearly 15 minutes. Dozens of women and children were knocked down and bruised, while scores of men had their clothing almost torn off, but so far as could be learned, none was seriously hurt.

Terror prevailed until it was found that the mate of the lioness who was roaring in his cage, had gone in an opposite direction from the crowd. By that time, however, every one had fled from the park or was crowded into the extreme eastern and northern ends of the 30-acre tract and ready for another dash at the first sign of danger.

In spite of the fact that the lioness was at large and its exact whereabouts unknown a strange fascination seemed hold many of the crowd within the park until a large force of men drove them away.

Immediately after the escape of the lioness her trainer organized a hunting party of nearly 200 armed with guns and clubs. The animal was located several times and attempts were made by shooting and shouting to drive her toward her cage. Finally, after a chase lasting more than two hours the beast was cornered and driven back into her cage, which had been carried to the spot.

TRAFFIC OFFICIALS

DO NOT AGREE

Claim That Meeting Furnished Strong Arguments for Government Control.

Chicago, Aug. 23.—After a stormy session yesterday, during which western track officials tried vainly to settle the grain rate war, several of them left the meeting declaring that it had furnished a strong argument in favor of government control or regulation of freight rates. The traffic men were unable to agree, despite the fact that the railroads are on the eve of the greatest grain movement in years.

AUSTRALIAN FINANCE BUDGET.

Treasurer Sir John Forrest Introduces Budget to House of Representatives. Melbourne, Aug. 23.—In the house of representatives, Sir John Forrest the treasurer, introduced the financial budget. The total revenue for the fiscal year of 1904-1905 is \$57,300,000; estimated revenue for the current year, Total expenditures for 1904-05 were: Administrative \$21,519,000; surplus returnable to the state \$35,705,000. The estimated expenditures for the current year is \$23,000,000; returnable to the state, \$33, 920,000.

COMMISSIONER JOHN H. EARLE ARRIVES IN CITY



John H. Earle of South Carolina, who has been in Portland with the National Railway Commissioners' association, arrived in the city last night with his brother, Dr. Baylis H. Earle, and will remain here today. Mr. Earle will be taken for a trip on the Columbia aboard the quarantine steamer Electro. Commissioner Earle is one of the most prominent men in South Carolina and has been associated with that state's political field, managing the campaign of his father, United States Senator Earle, and since figuring in a number of campaigns. He enjoys the distinction of having been a member of the late General Fitzhugh Lee's staff during the Spanish-American war. In all probability Mr. Earle will be a candidate for gubernatorial honors in South Carolina and will later aspire to the United States senate.

New Wireless Invented by Young Soldier at Benicia, Cal.

WEIGHS POUND AND ONE HALF

Has Been Given Exhaustive Test and is Highly Recommended by Signal Corps Officials—Hugh Annis, Inventor, Graduate of Polytechnical School.

San Francisco, Aug. 23.—A special dispatch to the Examiner from Benicia, Cal., says: A new wireless instrument weighing but a pound and a half and found by exhaustive tests to give better results than the more cumbersome machines now in use, has been invented at the Benicia barracks by Hugh Annis, a young soldier of the signal corps. The machine has transmitted and received messages from Mare Island and the Yerba Buena station time after time. The apparatus is now being used at the barracks and has met with high commendation from the officials of the signal corps.
