PAGEANT ON WATER

Marine Parade Proves the Best
Ever Held.

IS A MAGNIFICENT FETE

Hundred Boats Participate in Night Carnival on River—Japanese Lanterns and Electric Lights Used to Advantage in Decorative Ideas.

Eight years ago Astorians pronounced the marine parade during the regatta marvelous, but never in the history of the city, or, in fact, in the history of any city, has such a wonderful aquatic pageant as that of last night been witnessed. One is forced to realize how limited are his descriptive powers in attempting to paint a word picture of the marine parade. The thoroughness with which this remarkable feature was conceived and its able management reflects great credit upon Grand Marshal Dr. Baylis H. Earle and his associates, Messrs. Goodell and Babbidge. In justice to the last named gentleman it must be said that they easily share honors with Dr. Earle and they may well be congratulated upon the success of this, the greatest feature of the Eleventh Annual Regatta.

Probably a hundred craft participated in the parade. These offered decorative ideas of a hundred kinds, all worthy of especial mention, the majority of material recognition. The government steamer, Gen. Guy Howard, was easily the best decorated craft. Her first appearance in the river, brilliant with hundreds of incandescent lights attractively arranged, called for cheers from the beings who blackened the grandstand. Whether this decision will concur with that of the judges or not, we cannot say, but it certainly expresses the consensus of opinion among spectators. To attempt to segregate the craft according to the merits of their decorations would probably result in an injustice to the majority, but the Guy Howard was certainly the most attractive boat on the river last night.

The quarantine steamer Electro, the Mayflower and the lighthouse tender Columbine come in for second honors. Among the smaller craft, the gasoline boats were particularly well decorated and some of the yachts presented a handsome appearance with Japanese lanterns gaily swinging from their rigging. The formation of the marine parade was about as follows:

Columbine, flagship, Dr. Baylis H. Earle commanding; Guy Howard, T. Toosh, W. S. Ladd, Nahcotta, Shamrock, Mayflower, Patrol, Miller, Winona, Jordan, Electro towing yachts, Chief, Pilot, Louise, Francis, Queen, Sapho, Leonore, Alvina, Harrington, Ruby, Helen Scott, Restless, Harriet, Elk, Independence, Jessie and the Betty.

The Columbine cruised to the lower harbor and joined the fleet laying off the Fishermen's Union Co-operative cannery. With orders from Grand Marshal Earle, the Columbine came about and took the lead, the other craft following in proper order. The start seemed an unannounced signal for the pyrotechnical display, for almost simultaneously, the craft commenced to bombard the heavens with bursts of rockets and roman candles. Red fire was burned on nearly every boat. The searchlights of the larger craft were brought into play and aided in a transformation of night to day. Along the waterfront cruised the fleet, saluting now with whistles and again with rockets. Appreciation of the marvelous spectacle was not want, the thousands on the grandstand and the docks chering lustily. The boats were given a continuous ovation.

Abstractly, the parade was stupendous, wonderful, sublime, impressive, mystifying, original, awe-inspiring, striking, inevitable. From the standpoint of pyrotechnics, it eclipsed even the greatest of Pain's productions.

REMARKABLE OPERATION.

Thigh to Be Cut Open and Broken Bones Screwed Together With Ivory.

New York, Aug. 29.—Operations which have succeeded on another through months of pain suffered by Mrs. Arthur Paget, the well known society leader, have proved in vain and another most difficult one will be attempted next week, cables the London correspondent of the Herald. Mrs. Paget sustained a fractured thigh and the bones failed to knit sufficiently to support the weight of her body.

The operation now to be performed is a difficult and serious one, and will, it is expected, last three hours.

The side of the thigh will be cut open and an incision made until the fractured bones are encountered. They will be firmly screwed together with ivory and within a few months time, it is hoped the fracture will be united strong enough to bear the weight of the body.

NIECE OF ANDREW JACKSON IS DEAD.

Claimed Distinction of Being First Child Born in the White House.

Washington, Aug. 29.—Mrs. Carrie Emily Donelson Wilcox, said to have been the first child born in the White House, the grand niece of Andrew Jackson and a descendant of John Donelson the pioneer of Tennessee, is dead here, aged 75 years. Her husband, John A. Wilcox, was at one time a representative from Tennessee and also represented Texas in the Confederate congress.
