### ASTORIA'S OWN FAIR.

#### Libable to Be Made a Prominent Institution.

Constructive estimates made by the managers of the County Fair put the attendance, up to noon yesterday, at 18,000. The significance of this figure is emphasized when it is considered that the fair was hastily organized and furnished with its exhibits within the brief space of three weeks. Such complete successes are infrequent. The artistic and effective alignment of the goods on display (for which E. V. Jensen, the salmon expert, is entirely responsible) had much to do with the popularity achieved by this fair, and it is with genuine satisfaction the public learns of the purpose of the committee in charge to continue the fair for another two weeks. By the way it is rumored that President Herman Wise, of the Regatta Committee is personally responsible for the elegant oligravure of the "Farmer and Merchant" which adorns the front of the fair building, but whether as artistic, instigator, or simply as payor for the work, deponent sayeth not.

General Passenger Agent A. L. Craig, of the O. R. & N., has been appealed to by Judge Bowlby, chairman of the committee in charge, to despatch an inspector here to examine the scope of the fair, the nature of its exhibits and determine its right to a place in the company's advertising matter.
