Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, Sept. 3.—For the first time in several months, old hens have sold for the same price as springs.

Grain bags, which have been scarce all harvest, prove plentiful enough at the close of the threshing season.

Fresh ranch eggs are at a premium, and some dealers report sales of one-case lots at 25 cents.

Butter of all grades is considered firm today and prices are steady.

Flour made from new wheat sells for less than that made from old, but is not so satisfactory.

Hog growers report the condition of the crop about to be picked as excellent, and think Oregon's output this year will be uniform high grade.

Sweet potatoes arrived from Merced, Cal., in sacks today, for the first time this season. Prices have gone down to \$2 to \$2.25 per 100 pounds.
