The report finds that the books of the various departments are correctly kept and in addition shows that on July 1 of the present year the financial condition of the county, as was also shown ia yesterday appeared before County by the clerk's and treasurer's reports issued at that time, was the best that tions of becoming an American citizen, it has ever been. The total amount of the outstanding warrants, which is the county's indebtedness, including those drawn on the general fund, courthouse fund and Lewis and Clark bridge fund, was \$62,084.96, but to offset this there was \$17,232.41 in the hands of the treasurer, leaving a net indebtedness of \$44,852,55. A detailed statement attached to the report shows that there has been expended in the construction of the new courthous \$43,387,44. thus, aside from what has been spent toward the erection of a new public building and which may be rightfully termed as an asset, the county's net indebtedness is but \$1,465.14.
