Portland, Sept. 7.—Fresh cream becomes more scarce from day to day, and butter-makers do not look for any change in conditions until the fall rains start the green grass in the pastures of the Northwest.

Large numbers of chickens continue to reach the city in spite of the fact that the market is weak, and dealers fear that a further decline may result.

Strictly fresh eggs are considered firm at 24 1/2 cents, and cold-storage stocks are being largely drawn upon.

Considerable wheat is moving, in spite of low prices offered. As a rule, however, growers who are out of debt and have bank accounts are inclined to hold a while to see if prices will not advance.

Potatoes are in good supply and prices are not advancing.

Small peaches are weak in price and large ones firm.

Rice has advanced 1-4 cents per pound. The shortage in the crop of the South is given as the cause.

Cottolene has taken another rise of 1-4 cent, and is quoted at 8 1/4 cents.
