LIPTON IS INJURED

Thrown From Horse While Leading Regiment.

KING REVIEWS SCOTCH TROOPS

Famous Sportsman Is Thrown by Sudden Swerve of His Horse Which Kicked Him in the Face—Injuries Are Not Serious.

Edinburg, Sept. 18.—Sir Thomas Lipton, who is an honorary colonel of the Second Lancashire engineers, was thrown from his horse during the review of the Scotch volunteers today by the king. Sir Thomas was leading his regiment before King Edward, when his horse suddenly became unmanageable and he was thrown heavily to the ground. Sir Thomas was kicked in the face by his horse, but his injuries are not serious.

Sir Thomas' injuries consisted of a cut in the mouth and a bruised arm. He was unseated owing to a sudden swerve of his horse, although he is a good rider. The king sent an equeiry to Sir Thomas' hotel to inquire about his condition.

The troops comprised the greatest muster of soldiers under arms in Scotland since the battle of Flodden Field.

The king arrived at the Scottish capital this morning and proceeded to Holyrood Palace, whence, attended by the Duke of Connaught and a brilliant staff, he rode to the parade ground in King's park, where nearly 40,000 Scotch volunteers marched past his majesty. Enormous numbers of visitors from all parts of Scotland and the north of England witnessed the review, which is expected to assist in counteracting the extreme irritation felt in volunteer circles over recent worrying regulations of the war office.

KOMURA IS IMPROVING

Convalescence Now Well Established, Declares His Secretary. New York, Sept. 18.—Mr. Sato, secretary to Baron Komura, Japanese envoy, announced today at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel that Baron Komura's condition was much improved and that his convalescence was now well established.

NORWAY MAKES DENIAL.

Declares Untrue Story that Troops Are Being Mobilized. Christiania, Sept. 18.—Another semi-official denial was issued today of the renewed charges of Norwegian mobilization of troops made in this morning's Swedish newspapers. It declared that Norway had made no military preparations except such as were absolutely necessary from a defensive point of view and that the report that practically all the troops in central Norway and in the frontier districts had been mobilized is unfounded.

Russian Squadron Arrives to Communicate Terms of Armistice. Seoul, Korea, Sept. 18.—A Russian squadron was sighted Sunday off Zion-Chan, Korea. Its mission was to communicate the terms of the armistice to the Russian forces on the Tumen river.

the sum of \$1186, all of which had been expended upon the county roads within the limits of the city of Astoria, and for that reason the county court would not pay anything on account of road polls into the hands of the city treasurer. The matter was referred to the committee on ways and means and to the city attorney.

A protest, signed by Hugh McCullough protesting in forcible terms against the blocking of Duane street between 16th and 17th streets, with wagons and other debris, to the sore inconvenience of the passers-by and especially of ladies and children, was read, and the street superintendent was directed to enforce relief in the premises, by tonight.

A communication from W. E. Dement, offering to pay the original sum of assessment levied against him in the matter of the improvement of Astor street, amounting to \$60.20, principal and interest, was read and duly referred to the committee on ways and means.

The committee on ways and means submitted a report in which they recommended that the judgment held by the city against lot 3, block 3, Shiveley's addition, be cancelled, and the report was adopted.

They also recommended that the claim of John Svensen be paid, and the recommendation was adopted.

The committee on health and police reported, recommending that a liquor license be granted to L. Larson, and said recommendation was adopted and said license ordered issued.

The committee on streets and public ways, reported in the matter of the sunken sidewalk at the junction of Franklin avenue and 12th streets recommending that the matter be referred to the city attorney for opinion, and the report was adopted and the reference so made. They also reported on the remonstrance against the boundaries of the district involved in the improvement of Alameda avenue, and recommended that the same be filed. And the recommendation was adopted. The same committee reported in the matter of the petition for assistance in constructing a sidewalk four feet wide from the Taylor avenue improvement to the sash and door factory, recommending that the same be filed, and the report was adopted. And in the matter of the report of the city surveyor on the Irving avenue improvement from 33rd to 35th street, the same committee recommended the filing of said report and this was adopted.

The petition of F. H. and A. C. Fisher for permission to use a part of Franklin avenue for building purposes, was ordered filed.

The Spellmire communication in regard to the sidewalk on Franklin avenue and 12th streets, was referred to the city surveyor.

Reports from the proper officers were read and adopted in the following cases: In the matter of the Astor street improvement, completed; in the matter of the petition for the improvement of Kensington avenue from 9th to 11th street; in the matter of the certificate of approval of the completion of the 9th street improvement from the south line of Astor street to a point 224 feet north of the north line of Astor street; in the matter of the completion of the improvement of Hume avenue from the south line of Bond street to a point 33 feet south of the north line of Commercial street; in the matter of the improvement of Exchange street from 23rd to 21st; in the matter of the improvement of Exchange street from 17th to 19th street; in the matter of the report of the city auditor as to his cash receipts for the month of August, 1905, showing \$193.90 for fines, \$40 from city cemetery, and \$6 from building permits, or a total of \$239.

The ordinance heretofore filed with the council and read first and second times, fixing the salary of the city-hall janitor at \$50 per month came on for third reading, and was amended so as to make the salary \$65 per month, and was read a third time and passed as amended.

Requisitions for supplies for the office of the city attorney and for the department, as recommended by the committee on ways and means, were presented and allowed by the council.

The matter of the repairs needed on

the Adair street drain, between 33rd and 34th streets, was brought up and argued to a finish, and was disposed of by a successful resolution to improve the same by assessment and the establishment of a district for this purpose was ordered.

Pending claims against the city were then ordered to be filed with the proper committees, after which a long discussion took place upon the status of the claim of Contractor Ferguson for money alleged to be due on extra excavations made under the new city-hall, and closed without any new order being made in the premises.

It was ordered by the council that the committee on public buildings proceed to employ a good hand on the lawn of the municipal building, cleaning and clearing the same.

The final matter to engage the attention of the council was the election of a successor to J. V. Burns as councilman in ward No. 2; and in this behalf Mr. Morton nominated his former candidate, O. I. Peterson, and this was followed by the nomination of J. W. Welch by Mr. Strangeland; The vote was then taken, and resulted in the second election of Mr. Peterson, by a vote of 6 to 2 for Mr. Welch.

The council then adjourned.

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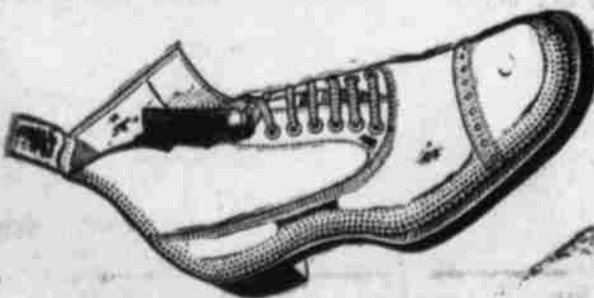
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
