On the 15-mile line of road north of Vesper, through the Fish-Hawk river country, the county has already expended the sum of \$354 for bridges, and has a contract out for the building of one and a half miles between Jewett and Vesper.

> So it seems that the court is not overlooking the Nehalem section entirely, but is seeking to keep its diversified road expenditures within the limits of impartial distribution as among the policy of aiding the nearer thoroughfares first.




