## ASTORIA'S SCHOOLS

### Directors Held Important Session Last Evening.

### TEACHERS AND SALARIES

Resume of the District Business for the First Month of the Term—Orders Made by Board—Work of Superintendent Clark Endorsed.

The board of school directors of school district No. 1, (city of Astoria) met in formal session last evening, at the office of E. Z. Ferguson, school clerk at which time and place there were present Directors Frank Taylor, J. W. Welch, August Holmes, J. A. Aiken and J. A. Higgins, Clerk Ferguson, and City School Superintendent A. L. Clark. President Taylor occupied the chair. The minutes of the two previous sessions were read and duly approved, after slight amendment.

Communications were read from the following persons, upon the subjects, and in the order named.

From Miss Sarah B. Gray, applying for position as substitute teacher in the district; ordered filed.

From Miss Clara G. Barker, principal of Taylor school, asking for an increase of salary, and was disposed of later in the evening, under another head of business.

From Miss Augusta Holmes declining assignment to room in McClure school. Ordered filed.

From the Fiske Teachers' Agency as to supply of teachers needed in department. Ordered filed.

From Miss Caroline Foster, declining appointment to service here, owing to previous engagement elsewhere and thanking board for consideration shown. Ordered filed.

From a Mr. Davis, complaining of a nephew, one Bertie Davis, a lad of 12 years, who should be in school, and not at work as he is at present. The board directed the city superintendent to inquire into the matter and take steps to enforce attendance of the boy, under the terms of the compulsory section of the school law.

From Miss May Morgan (addressed to Director Taylor) deprecating her change in assignment from the Shively to the Taylor school and asking what charges had been presented against her. Clerk Ferguson was directed to inform Miss Morgan that no charges had ever been filed. It developed the change was due to lack of discipline on Miss Morgan's part, and for no grave cause. The board has, and will exercise full authority on the assignment of teachers to such rooms and schools as shall to it appear expedient without necessity for accounting for their orders in the premises.

Requisitions for supplies from the various teachers and schools were then presented and the supply ordered, save in the case of a demand for a bell at the Taylor school, in which case Clerk Ferguson was directed to write for particulars as to quality and price and to report in due course.

The application of W. A. Sherman for appointment to the position of clerk of the board of directors (school clerk) was read, and ordered filed.

The matter of the election and assignment of teachers, as reported by Superintendent Clark, and of the salaries to be paid them and the several janitors, then came on for consideration and final action, and the result achieved is given below.

### IN THE CIRCUIT COURT.

At yesterday's session of the circuit court, the second information against Cornelius O'Riley, on a charge of larceny was dismissed and he was ordered discharged from custody.

A judgment for want of answer was granted in the case of George E. Plummer & company, vs. Charles Lutjens. This was a suit brought to recover \$6083.71 with interest at six per cent from December 31, being the balance alleged to be due on money advanced the defendant at various times.

The evidence in the case of P. J. McMananna, who is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon on Evert Hjorten was submitted to the jury, who at a late hour were still out.

### ON BARGE FOUNDATION.

Astoria, as a sea-port might be expected to have, has several homes founded on barges, or scows, the upper structure being in all things just like an ordinary cottage home. As a rule they are owned and occupied by some man who in his time has had much to do with ships, steamers and water-craft generally. The last, and a very pretty, specimen, has just been completed by Charles Isaacson at 29th street and Franklin avenue. His new home is founded on a barge 14 by 48 feet and the neat cottage above it, with its gable roof and plate windows is up-to-date and comfortable as any home in the city. It contains 3 rooms, closets, pantry and bath and is supplied with hot and cold water. The barge below it will be used as a combined lumber-room and cellar.

### GREAT GRAND NIECE.

Mr. and Mrs. I. N. McCormack, of Bowling Green, Kentucky, were visitors in Astoria yesterday, and guests at the Hotel Occident. Mrs. McCormack states that she is a great grand niece of Captain Merriwether Lewis, the famous explorer, on the distaff side of her house, her great grandmother being a sister of his. Mr. and Mrs. McCormack took a run down to Astoria, from the Lewis and Clark fair, to see some of the ground over which her distinguished relative passed in his celebrated voyage of discovery.

Doctors Fulton and Kinney met Mr. and Mrs. McCormack and extended them the courtesies of the hour, indulging in a drive about the city and luncheon. Mr. and Mrs. McCormack left for Portland on the Iarline last night.

## WITH REPUBLICANS

### Two Letters of Semi-Political Significance Arrive.

### TOMORROW WEEK THE TIME

Astoria and Clatsop Expected to Appear in Force at Portland—All Welcome—No Delegations—New Candidate for State Executive.

### THE ASTORIAN HAS TO OFFER THIS MORNING.

The Astorian has to offer this morning, two communications; which, at this writing, bear a semi-political relationship, in a superficial sense only. They happened to arrive here simultaneously, and both were addressed to the editor and proprietor of this paper. What closer intimacy may be established before, on, or after, the 12th day of October, there is no means of determining. They are simply published, and those interested may draw such inferences as to them shall seem, individually best.

It is hoped that Clatsop's contingent in the big republican conference, one week from tomorrow at Portland, will be entirely representative, and numerically strong enough, to properly enforce recognition of this balliwick in the councils that shall prevail.

The letters referred to are given below:

"Office of chairman republican state committee, Portland, Oregon, October 2, 1905.

"My dear Mr. Dellinger: Permit me to announce to the republicans of Clatsop county that the Empire theatre has been secured for the reunion and conference in this city on the 12th instant, and that ushers will be in readiness to see that everybody is made comfortable. There will be no reserved seats for Portland people, but all from the interior will be seated. Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, the conference will convene.

"Trusting that the Astorian will have at least one representative in attendance, I beg to remain, your humble servant,

"FRANK C. BAKER."

"Baker City, Oregon, Sept. 28, 1905.

"Dear Sir:—Subject to the terms and conditions of the primary law, I am and will be a candidate for governor on the republican ticket.

"It is not a question of salary. There are many things far more valuable than gold, and to my mind the office of governor of the state of Oregon is one of them.

"I am going to make an honorable

effort to secure that position and want all my friends throughout the state to assist me, and I appeal to them for support. Any promise or pledge will be made direct to the people; no other promises or pledges will be made. "I am not and will not be or become a candidate of any faction, any man, or combination of men. Will either be nominated or defeated on my merits, and will not in the least compromise my official integrity. Will stand by this, even though it should cost me the nomination. My nomination would not mean the success or defeat of any element of the republican party. I want to see the party harmonized and united and the whole ticket elected, and if nominated and elected will endeavor to accomplish that end and give the state a clean, honest, economical, business, republican administration.
