Portland, Oct. 4.—Dressed beef is considered weak in price by commission men.

"Hides are very high," one firm explained today, "and farmers adjacent to Portland who have cattle are killing them more for the purpose of selling hides than for what they receive for the meat."

"At this season many farmers are overstocked with cattle. The surplus animals, if fed through the winter will cut their heads off, and this fact further impels farmers to let their surplus stock go regardless of what the beef will bring."

"Bull beef and that of poor stags is largely in evidence, and as this is only fit for sausage, its use is limited at best. We have nearly given such carcasses away in order to get rid of them lately."

The local demand for chickens has been good all summer, as a result of large numbers of exposition visitors, but the damp weather of the past week has caused travel to diminish and this is looked upon as the main reason of the weak chicken market.

Choice potatoes are in demand for the local market and prices are firm. The weather prevents digging and orders cannot be filled. There is no shipping demand yet, however.

Fruit is disposed of as rapidly as it reaches the city, and there is no surplus carried over. The hawkers who depend upon buying over-ripe fruit to force on the market are virtually "out of a job."

Fresh eggs continue scarce and prices are up 1-2c. For single case lots of strictly fresh Oregon 27 1-2c is asked.

Oregon onions are now the favorite, the Walla Walla summer onions being almost gone.
