Portland, Oct. 9.—Some shipping demand has appeared for Oregon potatoes, but the condition of the fields prevents digging at this time.

"The potato crop of the entire coast was good this year," a prominent shipper said today, "but the Oregon Burbank commands a fair price, even in competition with the best varieties of California Rivers, Bodegas and the irrigated products of Nevada, Utah and eastern Washington."

In the livestock market sheep continue firm in price at the advance quoted today. Sheep raisers, as a rule, are inclined to hold in view of the good prices promised for wool in the spring, and wherever pastures and fodder for the winter can be secured flocks will be held over until shorn next year.

Lambs have practically disappeared from the market for the season, as they have become large enough to pass as grown sheep. Lambs will therefore not be quoted again until the winter-dropped lambs appear in the early spring market.
