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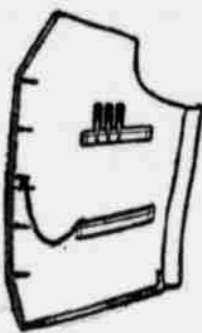

DOINGS OF THE CITY

Over Seven Thousand Dollars Appropriated for Streets.

COUNCIL SUSTAINS JANITOR

City Attorney Smith Is Absent and Councilman Belland Wants to Know Why Officials do Not Attend Meeting—Reports of City Officials Filed.

Ordinances appropriating between seven and eight thousands dollars for street improvements were passed by the city council at their session last night. Ordinances accepting five other street improvement contracts were passed, and an ordinance establishing the grade on Alameda avenue, from Columbia to Ilwaco. An ordinance establishing the grade on Harrison avenue was also up for action, and was given first and second readings, after an unsuccessful effort had been made to have it finally passed under a suspension of rules. An ordinance declaring the intention to improve Alameda avenue with a 30-foot plank roadway was passed, but was objected to by Councilman Belland, on the ground of lack of funds. Ordinances confirming the assessment rolls of four streets were also passed, and as soon as City Attorney Smith can prepare the necessary ordinances declaring the intention to improve, these will also be passed. A special meeting has been called for Friday night for this purpose.

Councilman Hansen, of the first ward, called the attention of the council to the impassable condition of upper Eighth street, where stone is now being laid. He stated that Contractor Gerding had offered to lay plank for a temporary roadway, if the city would provide the material. He stated that it was necessary that a passageway of some kind be effected, and that planking which came out of the O. R. & dock could be secured from Mr. Lebeck, at a reasonable figure. Mr. Lebeck stated that he would sell the city the lumber for \$2.50 per thousand, and Councilman Peterson thought the price was reasonable, as Lebeck, he said had asked him \$5 per thousand for the same material. A resolution was passed directing the street committee to purchase sufficient lumber to provide for the roadway.

The report of the public building committee, submitting two bids for the foundation to fire house No. 3, was read. Birch & Jacobson bid \$310, and John Slato \$310. The committee recommended that the lowest bidder be given the contract. Before the resolution was passed by the council, Councilman Belland arose and stated that he had been informed that Slato was bidding for Lebeck, and asked Lebeck if this was the case. Councilman Lebeck failed to take the question good naturedly, and replied that if the bid was his, his name would appear at the bottom.

A resolution was passed authorizing the taking of such steps by a committee composed of the mayor and the members of the building committee, as would insure a dry atmosphere in the city vaults. Councilman Kaboth, who brought the matter up, stated that the vaults, at present, were in such shape that the city books would soon be ruined. Aside from this, he stated that a gas bill of nearly \$30 had been incurred the past month, by the burning of gas in the vaults. He was of the opinion that a fraction of that amount spent in remedying the conditions, would do away with the nuisance permanently. Mr. Kaboth favored the establishment of connecting flues, but Mayor Suprenant was of the opinion that radiators to allow the heat from the furnace room below, to enter would be a better plan. No definite action was decided on.

A communication was read from the county court, stating that the county would not pay to the city, the money collected by the road supervisor. The letter stated that all the money collected had been expended on roads in the city and \$4000 besides. The communication was referred to the ways and means committee.

Reports from the city treasurer, the city auditor, and the police court were read and filed. According to the report of the auditor, the city's liabilities amount to \$294,544.68, while the resources are \$282,703.66, leaving an amount of \$211,831.02 by which the liabilities exceed the resources. The quarterly report of the city treasurer showed \$34,337.31 on hand, while the report of the police judge showed that \$78 had been received by the court during September, \$90 in fines and forfeitures, \$3.00 in building permits, and \$15.00 in burial permits.

Mrs. Sophia Maunula made applica-

tion for permission to erect a store, on a part of Thirtieth street, north of Franklin avenue, between blocks 147 and 148. The application was referred to the street committee.

An application by Alice Wood, for establishing of a surface drain, adjoining her property in block 53, Shiveley's addition was referred to the street committee. An application from C. C. Shepard, for permission to erect a sidewalk north of lots 11 and 12, block 35, Shiveley's addition, was also referred to the same committee.

A resolution was passed requesting the water commission to establish a hydrant at the southwest corner of Sixteenth and Exchange streets. The application of Wm. Humble, for the position of registration clerk was filed, as the charter provides that any expense of this nature must be borne by the city auditor.

A communication was read from Health Officer Pilkington, stating that a case of scarlet fever existed in the Cole house. Al Lashmutt, ten years old is the victim. The communication stated that the rooms occupied by the patient had been quarantined, and that the children of the neighborhood had been kept out of school.

Andrew Anderson, the janitor of the city hall, won out in his controversy with the water commission, over the cleaning of the water office. The committee on public property reported that the cleaning of the water office was not one of the duties of the janitor and the committee was sustained by the council.

There was just a trace of fireworks at the meeting last night, when Councilman Belland arose and wanted to know if anybody knew whether Toney Smith had skipped town. Pointing to the vacant chairs that are supposed to be occupied by the chief of police, the street commissioner and the city attorney, he wanted to know why those men did not attend the council meetings. They should find time, he thought, to do at least that much. The remarks were called forth by the absence of City Attorney Smith, whose services were required in connection with the drafting of ordinances declaring the intention to improve certain streets.

The following amounts were appropriated for street improvements: For the improvement of Commercial street, between Twentieth and Twenty-third streets, \$1017.40; for the improvement of Twenty-sixth street from the north line of Exchange to the south line of Franklin, \$989.77; for the improvement of Ninth street, from the south line of Astor to a point 234 feet north of Astor, \$1401; for the improvement of Hume avenue, from the south line of Bond street to a point 33 feet south of the north line of Commercial street, \$398; for the improvement of Commercial street, from the east line of Hume to the east line of lot 1, block 1, Hinman tract, \$906.75; for the improvement of the alleyway, from the east line of Thirty-eighth street to the west line of Forty-second street, \$1696.50; for the improvement of Duane street, from the west line of Tenth street to the west line of Twelfth street, \$1056.

Ordinances confirming the assessments on the following streets were passed: Duane street from the west line of Tenth with an assessment of \$1116.14; Twenty-sixth street from the north line of Exchange, with an assessment of \$1760.00; Fourteenth street from the south line of Grand avenue, with an assessment of \$2261.10; and Commercial, from the east line of Twentieth, with an assessment of \$1564.45. Ordinances declaring the intention to improve, will be introduced at the special meeting Friday night.

Clinton, \$9 and \$11; Street Assessors, \$40; Prael-Eigner Co., \$29; T. S. Cornelius, \$2.85; J. C. Clinton, \$14.25; Street assessors, \$67; T. S. Cornelius, \$3.90; J. C. Clinton, \$19.50; E. C. Linton, \$1.20 and 25c; Ross, Higgins & Co., \$3.70; J. H. Hanson, \$2.00; Fisher Bros., \$16.63; H. Seivert, \$12; Foard & Stokes, \$25.62; Fisher Bros., \$4.48; C. H. Orkowitz, 50c; J. C. Butts, \$16.00; and O. Anderson, \$80.
