NORELLI WILL NOT SING.
Sudden Cancellation of Concert Date in Astoria Explained.

Madame Jennie Norelli, the noted Swedish singer, has cancelled her concert date in Astoria, (this evening, at Logan's Hall) and for specific reasons. When she sang here before, on May 18, 1900, the madame contracted for the use of Fisher's opera house, for one night, at \$30, paying \$20 down. The contract was signed by Manager L. E. Selig, of the opera house and accepted by her agent, C. O. Carlson, in her presence and the presence of other witnesses, in a well-known business office in this city. The concert came off and was a dismal failure, not from any fault found with the splendid singer, but because her agent got up his program for the evening in Portland, printed there and bordered with the "ads" of Portland firms, a matter of indelicacy in the distribution of patronage soundly rebuked by Astorians, who refused to attend the concert on this score. The next day the great singer left for other fields, and her agent, Carlson absolutely refused to cover the balance due Manager Selig for the use of the house, despite the fact that he, the agent, had delivered to Mr. Selig, an order on Madame Norelli for the sum of \$10 still unpaid. When the order was presented to Madame Norelli, she referred it back directly to her agent, with the result stated, and the troupe left here, that much in arrears, at least, though there were other bills pending which were subsequently paid. At intervals, during the years that lapsed, Manager Selig has written the popular and successful artist for a cancellation of his claim. None of his letters have been answered. He wants his due in the premises and nothing more.

Hearing of her intended visit and concert here, Manager Selig advised her the other day of his desire for a settlement of his claim, plus a bill of \$4.00 for interest, and of his purpose, in default of such adjustment, to file suit and swear out a writ of attachment for levy upon the box-receipts, a program the madame could hardly face with composure and sing as she is wont to sing, and therefore is the Astoria date cancelled.

The fact that she will not appear here as advertised, will have no bearing on the purpose of Mr. Selig to recover what is due him, the suit will proceed, the levy be made wherever practicable, and the law invoked, for or against the claim as the issues shall determine.

Madame Norelli's repudiation of the claim, as being the affair of her agent, is not taken in good part by Manager Selig, who holds that she is the principal in the transaction, and endorsed the acts of her agent, and, no doubt, directed him in the doing of them, and, he thinks, her engagement of another hall for the late proposed visit quite confirmatory of the equity of his claim and of her disposition to meet it. This community is to be deprived of a genuine treat by reason of her failure to meet this paltry obligation, which, though it was of her agent's incurring was no less a debt of Madame Norelli's, she being the party directly in interest.
