Parties and People and Candidates are All in the Air.

ALIGNMENTS ARE FOGGY YET

Suggestions, Rumors, and Guesses are the Order of the Day—Some New Petitions Filed Yesterday—Registration Progressing Slowly.

The retirement of J. E. Higgins from the political field has been productive of more rumors as to the mayoralty and new names are being bandied about for this dignity. Asmus Brix, Henry Gray and J. W. Welch being among the conjectural many.

Eighty-four names were added to the municipal register yesterday, bringing the total for the three days they have been open, to 199. Following this ratio for the next thirteen days, when they will close, the registration will approximate 1100.

Petitions for the candidacies of John Nordstrom for City Treasurer and E. M. Houghton for Superintendent of Streets were filed at Auditor Anderson's office yesterday. These filings will come in a rush on Friday and Saturday.

Attorney-General Crawford has handed down an opinion in relation to the structure and use of the ballots in city elections, the effect of which will be apparent to all voters at the proper time and place, as all officers charged with the printing and putting out of the blank forms will conform to his rulings in the premises.

Things political are in innocuous shape just at present and will be until the primary election. A sort of "go-as-you-please" air hovers over the situation and the real interest in the campaign will not be invoked until after November 7th. Elementary conditions are always of a negative kind, but the "whoop" will be ready when it is needed, and the necessity will not be wanting.

The boy fell from a seesaw, while playing with a schoolmate, sustaining a broken collar bone and a fractured skull. Death came after an operation to relieve the injuries.

The funeral services of Mrs. R. S. Smith, wife of the Warrenton station agent, who died of diabetes, were held from Bob's undertaking parlors yesterday afternoon. The interment was in Greenwood cemetery.

Lieutenant Colonel Reed, lately stationed at Fort Caswell, N. C., has been assigned to the command of the local military district, including Fort Canby, Fort Columbia and Fort Stevens. He will arrive at Fort Stevens on the expiration of his three months' leave of absence.

James Finlayson Back From His Trip to Scotland

James Finlayson is back from a visit to the scene of his childhood in Scotland, and had the time of his life. He left Astoria on August 24, and sailed from Montreal on the Bavaria, journeying to the Atlantic seaboard on the Canadian Pacific overland. He left for home on October 4, and returned by the same route, with the exception of a small

deviation to take in a few of the large cities of the east.

Mr. Finlayson had not been to the old home in Scotland for seven years, but he found little change. The country is more prosperous, he thought, than it had ever appeared before.

Mr. Finlayson was particularly attracted by the rapid inhabitation of the farming portions of Canada. If the present rate continues, he declares, Canada will soon raise enough wheat to supply the markets of the world.
