Portland, Oct. 25,-Several uptown creameries complain of the falling off in the demand for fancy butter since the fair. These have reduced their top price to 30c a pound, or 60c a square, and yet the squares are inclined to accumulate, "The demand for fancy creamery fell off suddenly as soon as the exposition closed," a member of a creamery firm explained today, "and the 13c; fancy white, 121@131c. demand for ice cream almost came to a full stop also. The consequence is, cream is coming in faster than we need it, while butter is hard to get rid of, even at 30c a pound."

"Trade has fallen off with hotels and restaurants," another creamery man said, "and as these were among our best costomers during the fair, we have to look elsewhere for an outlet for our finest brands of butter."

On Front street best brands of country creamery are inclined to move slowly, although commission men ask but \$3.50@4.00 per dozen. 27 1-2c. Should present conditions prevail for any length of time, a further reduction in fancy creamery would be inevitable, in the opinion of firms dealing in best grades of butter.

Scarcity is a condition peculiar to the fruit in the market this fall, and prices are firm. Oranges and lemons are few, as this is "between seasons." There are some apples, which are held for better prices. The cost of staple fruits tends to limit the demand and the business of buying and selling is at a low stage.
