### PORTLAND MARKETS

#### Latest Quotations in the Portland Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, Oct. 27.—Potato shippers report an unwillingness on the part of growers to part with fancy stocks. Considerable inquiry from San Francisco within the past week has made quotations firmer, and, as usual in such cases, growers prefer to await until better offers.

"Large quantities of inferior potatoes are being offered," one firm reported today, "but these can only be disposed of in the local market, so are weak in price. There are plenty of inferior potatoes in adjoining states, and no potatoes are wanted except first-class Oregon Burbanks or other brands of equal quality. Potatoes, to be first-class, must be grown on sandy soil, so that only favored localities can produce such."

Portland sugar brokers attach little importance to the opening up of the Crockett refinery, in California, and do not believe that the Western Refinery people have been shut out of the Hawaiian Islands, so far as supplies of "raws" are concerned. The Crockett refinery is at the head of San Francisco Bay, and for several years was used in refining cane sugar, but those in control found the city of San Francisco more convenient for their purpose.

"The interests of the Western Refinery in the Hawaiian Islands are too the price of sugar on the coast would heavy to be shut out by a rival concern," said a representative of Kelley Clark Company today, "and even should not be affected."
