## MARINE MEMORANDA

**Steamship Oceano Again in the Harbor of Astoria.**

**LOG-RAFT FAST TILL SPRING**

Several Minor Accidents About the Bay—Telegraph and Lurline Will Be Here Today—Oklamama's Double Tow to Portland—Algoa Leaves for Japan.

The British steamship Oceano, Captain Davies, is again in Astoria waters having arrived at an anchorage under Tongue Point, from Portland, yesterday afternoon. She will probably go to sea this morning, if some further ill-luck does not intercept her. She is grain and flour laden for Japan.

**Telegraph Coming.**

Yesterday's Portland Journal has the following in relation to the Telegraph: "To test her new oil-burning apparatus, which had just been installed by the Willamette Iron & Steel Works, the steamer Telegraph took a spin down the river yesterday afternoon. She went as far as Portsmouth, and those who made the trip say that everything worked satisfactorily. The tanks of the steamer were filled with liquid fuel and she will probably resume daily service between here and Astoria tomorrow. The steamer will stop at a number of the way landings, but it is said that she will be easily able to complete the round trip. The owners are confident that she will be able to make far better time using oil than when she burned coal. The steamer Telephone is also to be converted into an oil-burner and very shortly there will not be a craft in local waters using coal and wood."

**Still She Hangs.**

At flood tide yesterday noon the Callender tugs Melville, Vanguard, Cruiser and Shamrock, and the tugs R. Miller and Lottie, fastened on the big sea-raft in Young's Bay and made another vigorous effort to dislodge it, but, while they swung the huge thing for a radius of 150 feet, it would not leave its pivotal position on the sands, and it will probably be let alone from now until spring, when other means will be taken to release it. This on the authority of the owners.

## FLOTSAM AND JETSAM

The steamship Algoa left this port at noon yesterday on her voyage to Japan.

The steamer W. H. Kruger left out at 3 o'clock yesterday morning with an immense cargo of lumber and a number of passengers, San Francisco bound.

The crackerjack towing steamer Okalahama went up to Portland yesterday forenoon with the barkentine Mary Winkleman on one bow and the three-masted schooner Matthew Turner on the other.

The motor schooner Della, bound out late on Saturday afternoon for Nestucca, was caught in the in-set ebb and jammed into the Lindenberg dock in pretty bad fashion, but did not receive injuries sufficient to deter her on her journey.

The lighthouse tender Columbine will depart this afternoon or early tomorrow morning for a trip with supplies to light-ship "No. 76," off Cape Flattery, after which she will proceed to Puget Sound on a round of official calls at the northern light stations, and meet Major Rossler of the federal engineers at Seattle.

The Shamrock met with a slight accident when docking at Knappton on Saturday night breaking her guard rail and tearing down her flagstaff. She was two hours behind her schedule on returning to this city.

The British ship William Mitchell has just docked at Tacoma, after the slowest sailing passage on record between that city and San Francisco. It took her thirty-five days to cover the distance and her officers are disgusted. Head winds from bay to straits, the cause.

## AGREE WITH SMITH

Attorneys Employed by City Coincide With City Attorney.

Opinions sustaining City Attorney Smith, in his contention that the present members of the Police Commission, who were appointed to fill vacancies, will hold the remainder of the term, just as their predecessors would have done, have been prepared by Attorneys F. J. Taylor, George Nolan and J. F. Hamilton, who were employed by the City Council, and will be filed with City Auditor Anderson today.

The opinions were completed and handed to Councilman Peterson of the Ways and Means Committee late Saturday afternoon. Councilman Peterson admitted to The Astorian that the opinions were in his possession, and stated that he would file them today. Each of the attorneys employed by the city to render an opinion coincides with the City Attorney, to the effect that the appointed members of the commission are in precisely the same status as the men whom they succeeded would have been, had they retained the office.

City Auditor Anderson stated Saturday, that while he had accepted the petitions of two candidates for the Police Commissionerships, only one could be placed on the ticket, unless the extra opinions should fail to coincide with the opinion of the City Attorney, and that the council should see fit to take action on these outside opinions. As the substance of these opinions is now known, and are known to be along practically the same lines as the opinion of City Attorney Smith, the possibility of any such action is done away with, and it is thus apparent that the auditor will refuse to place more than one candidate of the same party on the ticket.
