**PROPERTY TAXABLE**

Equalized Value of Clatsop County Property for 1905.

TOTALS SAME AS LAST YEAR

Notices Are Being Sent Out to Clerks of Schools and Road Districts so as to Enable Them to Make their Special Levies for the Coming Year.

A list showing the value of all classes of taxable property in the county has been filed with County Clerk Clinton and a duplicate copy has been sent to the Secretary of State. The valuation of property is approximately the same as last year and practically the only difference in the roll will be the exemptions made this year on personal property valued under \$300. In the county there are 6219 acres of tillable land taxable and 439,879 acres of untillable land listed on the roll. There are fifty miles of railway, three and one-half miles of street railway and 644 miles of telephone and telegraph wires. Following are the taxable values as equalized:

**Valuations for Districts.**

County Clerk Clinton has completed the segregation of the property valuations on the 1905 assessment roll among the several towns, and road and school districts, and is sending out notices to the clerk of each, so that meetings can be held for the purpose of making the special tax levies. Under the new law these levies in order to be placed upon the tax roll must be filed with the County Clerk before the first day of January, or one month earlier than usual. The total valuation of property in the county as shown by the assessment roll is \$4,721,873, and the valuation in the city and in each of the several towns, school and road districts is as follows:
