PORTLAND MARKETS

Latest Quotations in the Portland Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, Nov. 1.—Oregon potatoes are in demand in California, and buyers are willing to pay 65¢ to 70¢ a sack in the country for fancy stock. Dealers who have been in the potato-growing districts say that they do not find more than 3 per cent of this year's product to be "strictly fancy," and that inferior grades can be obtained as low as 50¢. The demand for the latter is only local, however, as none but very choice grades can be exported at a profit.

"Oregon potatoes have a good reputation in the adjoining states," one dealer said, "and where they come into competition with the product of irrigated fields, our potatoes have a walk over the higher prices. We expect to ship a large proportion of the Oregon crop southward this year, if we can obtain transportation in time. Up to now we have been hampered by lack of cars, however."

Fresh eggs are considered firm in price, and an advance is talked of. The willing to pay 45¢ a dozen, retail; and many grocers have standing orders with poultry-raisers for fresh eggs at 40¢. This causes a diversion of receipts from front street, where 30¢ has been the highest price thus far obtained, and an advance to 31½¢ for strictly fresh would create no surprise. Were it not for the presence of Eastern and local cold storage eggs, the price of fresh would be considered higher than it is.
