Girl Travels Seven Thousand Miles
to Wed Lover.

END OF ROMANTIC COURTSHIP

Charlotte Ripstorf Travels from Ham-
burg, Germany, to Meet and Wed the
Partner of Her Brother Whom She
Had Never Met.

Dason, Oct. 2.—Hearts across the seas
drawn together and rivited by the ar-
rows of cupid from the basis of one of
the prettiest of Klondike romances, a
romance which found its consummation
last night in Dawson when charming
Miss Charlotte Ripstorf became Mrs.
Edward Coprad. The bride arrived here
a short time ago from her home 7,000
miles away, in the great commercial
city of Hamburg. The groom is a Klon-
dike pioneer of 1897, and one of the
progressive and successful young Yu-
koners.

Eight years ago Conrad plunged mad-
ly into the race over Chilkoot pass for
Dawson. After five years here and after
making the acquaintance of Henry Rip-
storf, he learned through the letters
which Ripstorf read by the fireside in
their cabin that Ripstorf had a most
charming sister in the old German home
in Hamburg. The photographs and the
sweet letters the girl wrote, filled with
loving adoration and tender solicitation
for the brother so touched the big heart
of honest Edward that he at once took
a fancy to the maiden whose sweetness

about the bay and expressed his resolve

securing these things for Coos Bay as
ever he was in attaining similar aid for
the Columbia river, and its bar," where-
upon a stentorian voice rang through

HE FORSEES DANGER

Rae Calls Attention to Critical
Condition in Navy.

PERSONNEL BILL NOT SPECIFIC

Admiral Believes that if the Country
Were Suddenly Plunged Into War
With Amateurs in Charge Havoc
Would be Played With Machinery.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 2.—Rear Ad-
miral Rae, engineer-in-chief of the United
States navy, calls attention to the
"critical condition of engineering in the
navy," citing the Bennington disaster as
an example.

With the personnel bill, which merges
the corps of engineers into the line of
the navy, the corps of specialists is vir-
tually abolished.

It is the intention of the personnel
bill that they be ordered at once to the
performance of engineer duty in sub-
ordinate positions, but in the absence of
specific instructions in the bill and
powerful influences in the War Depart-
ment, for three years nothing has
been done by the younger line officers
and later, owing to the scarcity of of-
ficers, little in that direction has been
accomplished.

The admiral believes that if the coun-
try was suddenly plunged into war,
with amateurs in charge, havoc would
be played with the machinery connected
with modern ordnance.

The admiral believes a quick way to
supply a body of efficient engineers,
would be to provide that all the young
officers should be given engineering duty
in a subordinate capacity. He says that
in order to supply engineering special-
ist one officer in ten, above the rank of
lieutenant in the junior grade should be
given a course in higher marine engi-
neering for one year.
