Portland, Nov. 13.-Scarcity of cars continues to stop business between potato dealers and growers, and a consequent loss is sustained by both parties to the agreements. Growers, as a rule, are willing to sell at the prices quoted, an ddealers are anxious to take the produce for shipment South, but freight cars cannot be secured.

Dealers are in the onion growing districts, buying for export, and report growers as a rule willing to sell at quotations. The stock of summer on ions grown in California is about exhausted, as hey do not possess the keeping qualities of he Oregon fall product.

Poultry is in light supply, and commission men are glad of it, as the demand has not been great thus far this week. Coops of mixed chickens sell with difficulty at 10c, and, as Wednesday and Thursday are usually the best better trade toward Saturday. The poultry market, which has been dull since the closing of the fair, is not expected to revive until the week before Thanksgiving, when the high price of turkeys may stimulate the price of chickens. Dealers advise poultrymen to ship lightly at this time.
