Chicago, Nov. 13.—Dr. Frank W. Gun-

sing Cattle Man.

New York, Nov. 13.—No word from  
John N. Tisdale, the western miner and  
ranchman, had been received early to-  
day by his wife and son, who are at the  
hotel Seville. In regard to the dispatch  
from Cheyenne, Wyo., suggesting that  
Tisdale might have been done away with  
by some one of the cattle rustlers whom  
with other range owners of the West,  
Mr. Tisdale succeeded in rounding up  
fifteen years ago, W. J. Corlett, the step-  
son, said yesterday that this could not  
be.

Twenty-five men, he said, who assist-  
ed in the enterprise, were still alive  
and living in the neighborhood on their  
ranches. The famous round up when  
the band of cattle stealers was broken

New York, Nov. 13.—A small purse of  
gold has been received at the Jacob A.  
Ries neighborhood settlement, from the  
women of Colorado Springs, as a con-

gage upon the house.

From the Middle West and from the

received and the managers announce  
that half of the sum of \$30,000 has been  
raised, and that they hope to be able  
to burn the mortgage on New Years eve.

D. Rockefeller who has promised, if this  
is done, to repair and remodel the two  
old dwelling houses on Henry street,  
which the settlement occupies, at a con-  
siderable cost.
