DEDICATE NEW HALL

Redmen Consecrate New Home With Appropriate Services.

GREAT INCAHONEE SPEAKS

Braves from the Neighboring Camps Attended the Great Jollification Feast—Elaborate Banquet Served at Close of the Festivities.

The Redmen of Astoria had the day of their fraternal lives yesterday, when they jointly celebrated the dedication of their elegant new hall in this city and the arrival of their Great Chief Incahonnee and Great Chief of Records, with the lesser dignitaries of the two states of Oregon and Washington. The chief events, of course, transpired at the new hall, in the evening:

Long before the hour set for the commencement of the evening exercises, the new hall of the Redmen was filled to overflowing with th members of Concomly Tribe, and the visiting brethren from Portland, Clatskanie, Skamokawa, Cathlamet, Stella, Chinook, Hammond, Svenson, Goble and Seaside, gathered to participate in the grand reception and dedication.

The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock promptly, by Sachem Thomas Dealey, who appointed C. E. Foster and J. H. Hansen as his special sennaps, for the occasion. At 8:15 o'clock the arrival of the Great Chief Incahonnee and the Great Chief of Records was announced. They were escorted into the hall, and introduced by First Sannap Foster; they were received standing and the honors of the organization were given them. When these happy formalities were disposed of, the dedication ceremonies were at once taken up and proceeded with under the full ritual, the following dignitaries leading in the work: Great Chief Incahonnee J. W. Cherry, of Norfolk, Virginia, officiating; assisted by Great Chief of Records Wilson Brooks of Chicago, Illinois, as Great Prophet; Past Great Sachem H. L. Henderson, of this city, as Great Senior Sagamore; Great Trustee of Oregon, G. W. Thomas, of Portland, as Great Junior Sagamore; and Past Great Sachem T. J. Bell, of Tacoma, Washington, as Master of Ceremonies.

After the dedication was completed addresses were delivered by Great Incahonnee Cherry, Great Chief of Records Brooks, Past Great Sachem Bell, Henderson, Pohl, of this city, and by the Sachemes of the Tribes of Clatskanie and Skamokawa, and by Sachem Dealey of the home tribe.

The Great Sachem of Oregon, W. H. Conyers, of Clatskanie, was present, but as he was suffering from a severe cold was unable to participate to the extent of an address. At 11 o'clock all adjourned to the banquet room where a sumptuous spread awaited them. Here an hour was spent most delightfully in fraternal toasts and responses thereto, and the small hours had dawned before the greatest event in Redmanship in this city, closed.

In his address Great Incahonnee Cherry paid splendid tribute to the Concomly Tribe for its energy in building such a grand monument to Redmanship and especially complimented the building committee: M. W. Pohl, A. Birch, O. Anderson and W. C. A. Pohl. This was supplemented in the subsequent address of Great Chief of Records Brooks, who presented a fine plaque of Chief Con-

comly after whom the local tribe was named.

The Great Chiefs leave this morning for Portland, where they will be entertained this evening. From there they go to California, and thence East and hope to reach their homes about Christmas.

There were over 300 members present at last night's festivities, a crowd none too impressive for the rank of the guests, nor for the handsome hall that was dedicated. The hall, just completed at a cost of \$300, is a building 25x100 feet, one story in height, the first floor being raised above the street so that a ten foot basement provides a large and handsome banquet hall; the whole being richly furnished, making it, beyond doubt, one of the very neatest lodge halls on the Pacific Coast.

Workmen Will Strike.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—In view of the condemnation to death of so many sailors who mutinied at Cronstadt, delay in carryin out the reforms outlined in imperial manifesto, the proclamation of martial law in Poland and other repressive acts, the council of the workmen's delegates, has decided to proclaim a general strike throughout Russia today.

Policemen Independent.

Odesa, Nov. 15.—Considerable unrest continues to pervade the city. Loiting and attacks on individuals is reported to have occurred in various quarters. The new prefect up to the present time has not taken drastic measures, and in consequence the people fear to leave their homes after nightfall. The theatres are open but deserted. The University opened today. A number of policemen have resigned, but openly asserted they had secured sufficient plunder during the disturbances to make them independent.

SCHIFF ON THE JEWISH RACE.

Hebrew Has Large and Generous Heart for Those Afflicted.

New York, Nv. 14.—Jacob H. Schiff, at the annual meeting of the educational alliance last night referred to the conditions in Russia and also spoke on the Jewish race. He said:

"The turmoil in Russia must have some serious consequences to the United States. It will mean an immense immigration and this country must keep its doors wide open to allow those who flee from that country to enter. The Jew has a large and generous heart for those afflicted and will aid greatly in hospitals and like institutions. But when it comes for a Jew to contribute for the head, for education, nothing can be said.

"There are many races of the Jew, five or six at least. The races cross in this country and they will unite in making the greatest Jew that ever existed, the American Jew.

"If we want this, we must do our duty to that race and in the end the world will get the benefit."

VICTIM OF WRATH

Chaban Boy Banished From Albania.

SULTAN SETS PRICE ON HEAD

Suffers Confiscation of His Estate and Other Forms of Persecution Because of Revolutionary Ideas Propounded—Working for Foreign Missions.

Boston, Nov. 14.—Banished from Albania after his estates had been confiscated, Chaban Bey, on whose head the Sultan of Turkey has set a price, was one of the passengers on the White Star liner Canopic, which arrived from Mediterranean ports yesterday. He has come to this city in the interest of the American Board of Foreign Missions to try to raise funds for a boys school in Albania.

Mr. Bey said that the Turks had closed all the schools in Albania, with the exception of two missionary schools for girls which, he says, they do not dare close. He declares that his banishment from Turkey was caused by the revolutionary ideas propounded by him.

a settlement of Odell's suit, as he feared powerful influences at Albany would be invoked in retaliatory measures. Harriman suggested that one of these measures would be the revocation of the charter of the Mercantile Trust Company.

Charges of conspiracy to get him out of the country were made by Hyde against Harriman and H. C. Frick. In connection with the reported aspirations of Hyde to become ambassador to France, he said Frick had inspired the idea and the witness took it as a joke at first, but when Frick brought it up later Hyde was flattered. Both Harriman and Frick promised to use their influence to secure the appointment.

Were Interested in Hyde.

Hyde waxed bitter in his explanation of the extraordinary interest these gentlemen had in his absence from the country. He said he thought their idea was that "they would acquit themselves of their friendly stewardship with great profit to themselves," and added the nature of their interest had since become very obvious. Hyde charged Frick with breach of faith, in leading him to believe the Frick committee was "friendly" to him, and doing all he could to dissuade the witness from selling stock at the same time, as Hyde said he was "doing everything on that committee, he could to knife the value of that stock."

Into the Receiver's Hands.

Hyde said he didn't think the report at all fair and that the committee posed as friendly, while he was being attacked on the other side by Alexander and his friends, under the sham of Mutualization.

Harriman, he said, had asked him to move the adoption of the Frick report at a meeting of the board, but Hyde said he absolutely declined, as it was condemnatory of everything that had ever transpired in the society, and he was advised by his counsel, that such a step would throw the Equitable into the hands of a receiver.

Hyde was still on the stand when adjournment was taken.
