WANTS A BIG NAVY

President Urges Necessity for An Extension.

SECRETARY OF NAVY OPPOSED

Bonaparte Will Turn Down Recommendation of General Board for Construction of New Ships, Although Known to Conform to President's Ideas.

Chicago, Nov. 17.—A dispatch from Washington says that differences of opinion appear to exist between the President and his Secretary of Navy on the subject of naval extension.

The President has been urging the necessity for a big navy and pushed his views at times to a point where he could not get Congress to follow him. Secretary Bonaparte is opposed.

The secretary has decided to turn down the recommendation of the general board of which Admiral Dewey is president, for the construction of three new battleships. This plan was adopted by the general board to support the President's known wish.

TROUBLES GALORE.

Lum Long, the lord of Chinatown, was about resigned to the departure of his wife "with a handsomer man," when his philosophic resignation was disturbed yesterday, by the appearance on the premises of Kum Wing & Co., (the non-de-plume under which Lum does merchandising.) of Sheriff Thomas Linville, with four writs of attachment, which were promptly and consecutively served. The complaints are: Louie Guy Him, et al., who set up a claim for \$278.30 Chin Tien Mow, \$124; Jung Shing, \$525; and John H. Woodward, the lawyer appearing for the other claimants, and whose claim antedates theirs some two or three years, in the further sum of \$350. This puts Lum Dong up against \$1277.30.

CANNERY MODEL.

E. V. Jensen, of this city, who delights in just such work, has completed a fine model of the fishing and canning industries, on the Columbia river, as carried on by J. Lindenberg, Incorporated, and the whole system can be easily put in a shipping case four feet long by one wide and one deep. It was photographed yesterday morning, in detail, by Charles T. Bell, the artist, in order to insure it against any mix-up on the long journey destined for it; for the Lindenberg people are going to ship it to the world's fair at Genoa, Italy, where it will undoubtedly form an item of intense interest, and, it is hoped, of much profit to its owners, and the clever man who built it.

Over 26,000 passports have been issued in the last two weeks.

Railroads Work Regularly.

Moscow, Nov. 17.—All railroads except the Nicholas line are working regularly today. There was only one train from St. Petersburg today, but the railroad traffic from Moscow to St. Petersburg has been resumed. The telegraphers, at a meeting today, resolved to direct their energies solely to economic purposes, and to entirely disregard politics. The factory strike was extended today. The strikers are organizing a workmen's council, after a model of the council at St. Petersburg. A committee, however, pronounced itself as opposed in principle to the general strike, declared in St. Petersburg.

Strike Ended in Poland.

Warsaw, Nov. 17.—Regular railroad traffic has been resumed throughout Poland, the strike of the railroad men having ended. Normal life in the city is resumed. Banks and stores have reopened and factories are in operation. When the telegraphers appeared for work today, they were informed they were discharged for participating in the strike and their places were filled.

Senate Candidates Named.

Helsingfors, Nov. 17.—The convention of the Constitutionalists, held here today, prepared a list of candidates for the Senate to replace those resigned. Many Finns, prominent in the Nationalist movement were among the candidates. The state of Linder refused to present the names to the Emperor. This resulted in a deadlock.

Prefect Advises People Not to Yield.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.—General Ledulin, the prefect of police, issued a proclamation today calling on the inhabitants not to yield to the demands of the strikers for cessation of work, which it is pointed out, are sometimes accompanied by threats. The proclamation announces that all measures will be taken for the repression of violence.

Close to Half Million Work.

New York, Nov. 17.—Contributions from all parts of the country to date for the relief of the Jewish sufferers of the Russian massacres, amounts to \$370,000.

Another demand which the witness said Mr. Clunia made was that a complete set of Equitable books be kept at the offices of the San Francisco agency, which would have cost that society about \$75,000. He also said that under the law of California the commissioner could have collected his \$33,000 fee from the Equitable society upon making his proposed valuations of its policies.

"Your Rambunctious Friend."

Senator Depew was re-called to give any information he might possess, as to the number of vouchers for legal services, but his knowledge of the matter was limited, as he never heard of many expenditures nor the signers of the vouchers. One voucher was shown to Senator Depew, referring to, "our friend who comes round once a year," and "your rambunctious friend up the river." The Senator said he knew Nichols had been retained different times by the Equitable, but did not know in what connection. Nichols, he said, was once quarantine commissioner, and used to be active in politics.
