### RUNNING DOWN AN ITEM.

How a Reporter Has to Get in and Hustle for News.

From a lowering sky and the dubious downpour of a chilly rain, a reporter took refuge for a few minutes in the Bond street store of W. C. Laws & Co. yesterday morning, upon the bare chance, also, of picking up an item of news. W. C. Laws, himself, was too busy to talk, but his father, and partner, J. N. Laws, while he was busy enough, found time to vent his opinion of the modern, jim-crow stoves that are reaching this market. Said he: "Modern stoves are a riddle to me; they're plumb full of buncombe novelties; they've all got some new and useless feature; some of them furnish the housewife with a step-ladder attachment to the oven-door and a long handled brush for sweeping cobwebs from the top of the pipes; others have lids you can't smash with a sledgehammer (until you hit 'em just right); and still others furnish a barometer, or a chronometer, or a clock, or some other automatic mechanism for keeping tab on the the cook or cooking; one and all are charged with some highflutin', experimental appendages that you have to charge for, and proves worthless as soon as it ought to go to work in the home of your customer."

"I've been 27 years in the stove business. I'm the oldest stove man in Astoria, and am supposed to know a little about stoves, and I do know them and all the catchpenny didos that are palmed off with them. They're no good. There's a Bridge-Beach stove. It's been ordered. I'll ship it out today. I don't like them, either, for the simple reason, when you've sold one to a family you've got to wait 15 or 20 years before you can sell 'em another. I've sold lots of them; most of our customers have got them in the past 3 or 4 years and we'll have to wait half a score of years before they'll even begin to talk stove. Yes, they're the best stove on the American market, all right! Why? Well because the men that make the Bridge-Beach have been at it for 68 years and haven't learned, yet, how to roodoo a customer. They build of only prime material and build on scientific rules throughout. They follow their one, simple, honest system, from the metallurgical to the mechanical, and never vary from it."

"They build a stove they can guarantee for a generation, and the blamed thing lasts two. How can a man sell stoves like that? Oh! we sell 'em, yes, of course; but never a second one to the same family. The average business career is only 40 years duration, and I want to see my stove customers more than once."

The reporter had gotten warm and dry by this time and having no special word of comfort to leave, left.
