WIRELESS FROM WARRENTON

Interesting Items Garnered in That Place Yesterday.

Kelley Bros. are making rapid progress in the remodeling of the old Warrenton mills, and expect to have the plant ready for business shortly. The dry-kiln has been moved across the street from its old location, and will be doubled in capacity; three new boilers will furnish steam for running the plant, and another new engine will be installed, making two in the service; shingle and lath mills will be added, and an electric lighting plant put in for the use of the mill people and employes. When these projects are completed, the plant will have a capacity for 50,000 feet of lumber and 70,000 shingles and 20,000 lath, per day.

The prospects are bright for the resumption of work at the Warrenton Lumber Company's plant, in Warrenton. Several firms have been on the ground for the past few days, looking over the business and it is probable something of moment will transpire there very shortly.
