NO NEED FOR WORK

Jersey City Policeman Discovers a Rich Uncle.

SURRENDERS HIS POSITION

Leaves for Los Angeles to Join His Wealthy Relative Who Has Amassed a Fortune, and Who Is Determined to Distribute it Among His Relatives.

Jersey City, Nov. 22.—The Western express on the Pennsylvania railroad left here last night carrying as a passenger, George Stratford, a Jersey City policeman, who two hours before train time, gave up \$83.33 a month to go to Los Angeles, Cal., on the summons of an uncle, who, it is said, is bent on the distribution of a fortune of many millions among his prospective heirs before his death.

Stratford's uncle is Thomas C. Ritchelaw, an Englishman, who, fifteen years ago, invented a means of saving fuel in firing locomotives, and amassed a fortune. He then began a search for living relatives.

He crossed the Atlantic eighteen times in search of a sister who was in search of him. She found him through a newspaper advertisement and told him of his two nephews, George and Edward Stratford.

He invited them to visit him. George went, returned to Jersey City on Monday, resigned and is returning to his uncle.

Perkins Says Reports Are Exaggerated.

New York, Nov. 22.—George W. Perkins, who has just returned from Europe, is very reticent as to the Russian loan and financial matters in general. "Reports that have come from Russia are very much exaggerated," he said, "and the situation is not nearly as bad as it is painted." "Did you really have to charter a

boat and pay a large sum in order to get away from St. Petersburg?" Mr. Perkins was asked.

"There is not a word of truth in those stories," was the reply. "I had no trouble getting out of St. Petersburg, and there was no reason for any hurry."

"Perkins Didn't See the Judge."

New York Nov. 22.—George W. Perkins, partner of J. P. Morgan and vice president of the New York Life Insurance Company, arrived here from Europe on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse last night. Asked whether he had seen "Judge" Andrew Hamilton wanted as a witness in the legislative investigation abroad, Mr. Perkins said:

"No, I did not see Mr. Hamilton. I did not go for the purpose of seeing him, and I had no instructions to see him. My visit to Europe did not concern him at all."
