RECORD TRIP.

The French bark Emond Rostand has made a record trip in circumnavigating the globe, or at least the greater part of it. She left Havre, France on November 12, 1904, for Hobart Town, Australia, and made it in 76 days; thence to Sidney in six days; left Sidney on March 1, 1905, for Falmouth, England, and made that port in 87 days; left Falmouth for Dunkirk on June 5 and arrived at Dunkirk two days later; left Dunkirk on July 7, for Newcastle, Australia and arrived on September 27, thence, on September 29 for Port Townsend, and with six days detention on Straits of Fuca, reached Port Townsend on November 19, and this port yesterday. The running time for this long voyaging was 311 days, a wonderfully short period of time for an outward voyage from Europe to the Antipodes back again, to the Antipodes and thence to this Northwest coast.

ONE MARRIAGE LICENSE

Nothing exciting or lively, or snappy going on; but the routine keeps up at a pace indicated by the following records made yesterday:

John G. Gustafson went on record as being desirous of becoming a citizen of this country in due time. He is a native of Finland.

Alec Harold Hayberg, a native of Sweden, a young and stalwart man with a good face, and a good purpose, yesterday took the oaths of full American citizenship before Judge C. J. Trenchard, and his papers as such, were delivered to him. The character of the affidavit required of a man becoming a citizen of this country is of the highest and gravest nature and to hear the oath administered is a lesson in itself to the careless native born citizen. There is a dignity and lofty purpose in it, that is inspiring, and it would pay some people who hold their natural prerogative a bit lightly, to read over the text of the oath demanded of the alien, and to remember that more is expected of the man to the manor born, than of him who acquires the privilege by legal procedure.
