Hints on Past and Present Municipal Finance.

ODDS AND ENDS OF LOGIC

Political Jars and Hunches—Suggestions that Are Practical—Some of the Duties Confronting the Good Citizen—Everyday Hints and Conclusions.

When the Republican party, as such, relinquished the government of this city on December 31, 1891, the municipal debt stood, less \$23,628.41 in the city treasury, at \$86,487.21, full and final. On the 30th day of last September, after nearly 13 years of Citizens' administra- tion, it stood \$211,841.02, plus a value- less credit claimed in the sum of \$10, 683.44, or actually, \$222,524.46, or in excess of the \$215,000 charter limit, just \$7,524.46. These are record figures, and are given as a preliminary hint of more to come; and incidentally, it may be mentioned that the 'Citizens' had the charter debt limit increased \$15,000, in order to avoid just such an excess dis- crepancy, a few years ago. Think of this you tired taxpayer, and find a way out of it.

Have you registered? You have got just twelve more days in which to do it. At 4 o'clock on the afternoon of Sat- urday, December 9th, you are shut out. Be a Republican in every sense of the word and Register!

The Democratic policy of a "wide open town," stinks in the nostrils of every decent man of family in Astoria. What parent of growing boys and girls is going to tolerate such a condition? There is a sad enough history inter- woven with the past, under that wretched policy, to put every mother and father of the municipality on their guard.

Self-respecting workmen will vote down the "wide open town" ticket, to a man. There is temptation enough on all sides, even now, to weary a man trying to live a decent life, without spreading the net until a man must walk into it whether he will or not.

Why this painful silence on the part of "our friend, the enemy?" Why does the shrewd and politic Democrat refuse to come up to the campaign scratch, and say his little say? The Republicans have given him a daily precept to preach upon! The man with only a "wide open town" text has but a poor spiel to make. Silence is safer.

'Twas a nice little scheme to butt in, take the lead on a supposedly popular issue of a "wide open town," and ride into power in town; to capture the town was to put the political foot into the stirrup of the county saddle, and the gambling room, the dance-hall and a few other choice, moral elements of the sort, were to do the rest.
