**FIX THE HOLIDAYS**

Special Meeting of Board of School Directors.

**THANKSGIVING — CHRISTMAS**

Two Vacations Pending for the Astoria Teachers and Children—Doors of Several School Houses to Be Changed to Conform to City Fire Ordinance.

The board of school directors for district No. 1, the City of Astoria, met at 7:30 o'clock last evening, at the office of School Clerk E. Z. Ferguson, upon the call of the president, Judge F. J. Taylor, to consider several matters of importance; and there were present at the meeting: Directors F. J. Taylor, J. A. Aiken, J. E. Higgins, J. W. Welch and Aug. Holmes, City School Superintendent A. E. Clark and School Clerk Ferguson.

The board was called to order by President Taylor and the following matters were disposed of in sequence:

A report from City Superintendent Clark on the matter of the doors of Shively and Alderbrook schools and their swinging inward instead of outward, and of the bolts confining them, and recommending their immediate correction, was read, and led to general discussion. The matter was promptly treated and resulted in an order that the Repair Committee proceed at once with the changing of the doors, at Shively, Alderbrook and the old Adair buildings to conform to the ordinance of the city.

The question of holding school on next Friday, the day after Thanksgiving, came on for discussion and resulted in a ruling directing that the schools be closed from Wednesday evening (tomorrow) the city.

The president advised the fixing of the Christmas holidays, while the board was on the subject, and after a brief argument it was ordered by the board that the schools remain closed from Friday evening, December 22 until Wednesday morning January 3, 1906 a period of eleven days.

The matter of devising and supplying the various schools with the necessary scrapers for use by the children was also left to the committee on repairs, with directions to make provisions at once.

The matter of Miss Lena Fat-saband's service in Room 2, Alderbrook, while Miss Smith was under suspension, was brought up, discussed, and resulted in an award of \$13.75 for one week's service.

It was ordered by the board that the substitute teacher now in service should be employed, in all cases where a regular teacher, for many cause should fail to take charge of their rooms, and that in any case where the substitute is already employed in this behalf, the superintendent shall be immediately notified, he to take prompt and requisite action.

It was ordered by the board, in the cases of Vern Elbon, Willie Thompson and Magnus Hendrickson, now under suspension from the Alderbrook school, for cause, and reported by Prof. Kesler in a statement filed last night, that the same be placed on file.

In the matter of tuition-pupils and their suspension in case of non-payment of their tuition fees, several of whom were reported last night, it was ordered by the board, that hereafter, all pupils entering the schools as tuition pupils, with the purpose of subsequent enrollment in the district, shall pay their tuition fees in advance to the school clerk, subject to a refund by the board of directors, in the event of enrollment, upon proper showing made by the parent or legal guardians of the children, in each particular case; all statements filed in abatement of the tuition fees, from any cause, must be backed by the sworn affidavit covering the circumstances pleaded in such abatement. The board then adjourned.

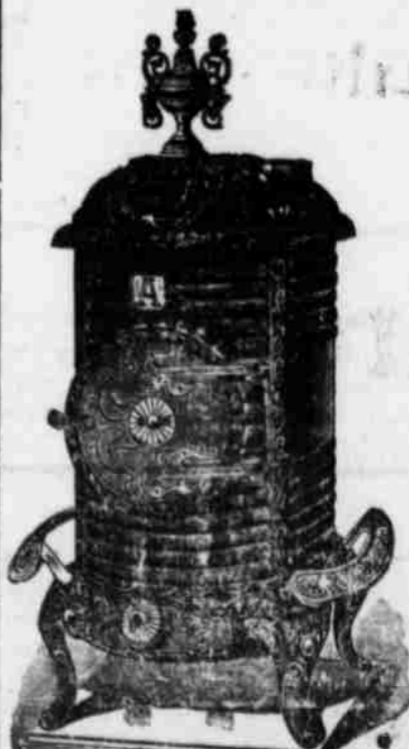
