**TERRY AND DANE**

"Battler" Signs to Meet Brooklyn "Terrible."

WILL FIGHT AT PHILADELPHIA

Articles Call for 133 Pounds at Nine o'Clock and Principles Will Receive 75 Per Cent of Receipts—Contest for Six Rounds.

New York, Nov. 29.—Terry McGovern and "Battling" Nelson will box six rounds early in January in the Second Regiment armory in Philadelphia, says the World. The match was arranged yesterday by Bob Deady, a Quaker City fight promoter. He succeeded in convincing Joe Humphreys, manager for McGovern, that the bout would draw at least \$20,000. The boxers are to receive 75 per cent of the gross receipts, to be divided equally between them in accordance with the law in Pennsylvania, where no decisions are given. Before Mr. Humphreys signed the articles of agreement, Deady assured him that Billy Nolan, manager for the Battling Dane had agreed to the terms. The articles call for them to weigh in at 133 pounds on the night of the fight, at 9 o'clock. This will make the bout practically the lightweight limit as the men will enter the ring at about 10:30 p. m.

Sam Harris in behalf of McGovern posted \$1000 with Deady to guarantee McGovern's appearance. Mr. Royce of Philadelphia was named to referee the bout. Nelson and his manager are now in Cleveland, where the former is giving exhibitions of the moody art. The articles, signed by Humphreys, were mailed to them last night. McGovern will begin training for the bout next week.

**ACCEPTED GRAFT.**

Kansas Attorney General Seeks to Oust County Attorney.

Topeka, Kas., Nov. 29.—C. C. Coleman, attorney general, has filed in the Supreme Court an amended petition in the ouster proceedings against James S. Gibson county attorney for Wyandotte county. As in the original petition, Mr. Coleman specifically charges Gibson with violating his oath of office by permitting the "joists" to run with his knowledge and consent. He alleges that Gibson demanded and received \$5 each from "joint" keepers in the county as a bribe. These payments, it is asserted, were made as immunity from arrest and prosecution. But in this amended petition the attorney general says even the brewers were taxed \$5 for each saloon owned and operated by them in the county and that gamblers were allowed to run openly by paying a stipulated sum to Gibson quarterly. The amended petition goes much further than the original in that it gives a list of "jointists" who it is alleged paid Mr. Gibson for immunity.

**HARVARD AFTER FOOTBALL**

Rules Must Be Changed and Much Better Enforced.

New York, Nov. 29.—Discussing the announcement that the Harvard overseers are likely, at their next meeting to take up the subject of football reform, Edmund Wetmore, a Harvard overseer board member said yesterday: "I think there can be no doubt that the board will take up the question at its next meeting. I am strongly in favor of a revision of the rules. I do not think that the game should be continued as it is at present played. It seems probable to me that the overseers will call before them competent authority and hear what those best in a position to speak have to say about the situation. It may be that a radical change in the rules is required and it may be that it is only necessary to enforce the present rules strictly."

**WHALING BARK LEAVES.**

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—Another of the old time whaling barks is to be sent back to New Bedford, Mass. Yesterday the Alice Knowles sailed out of the Golden Gate for the last time, under orders to end her cruise at the old New England port, where whalers in this country first became famous. For nearly a generation this stout old whaler has made San Francisco her rendezvous and home port. She has done well on many a cruise, but of late the catch in the Pacific has been small and now the owners look to the whaling ground of the South Atlantic for their best catch, and New Bedford will be nearer when the cruise is ended.

**REDMEN GIVE MASK BALL.**

Large Attendance at Function Given in Foard & Stokes Hall.

One of the most successful dances given in the city for some time occurred in Foard & Stokes hall last evening given under the auspices of the Order of Redmen. It was a mask affair and the prizes offered for the best costumed dancers lent interest and enjoyment to the occasion. Shortly before midnight the prizes were announced, just previous to the unmasking. Over a hundred couples were on the floor, and the hall was also filled with spectators.

New York, Nov. 29.—Walter J. **TROOPS AT HOME**

Victorious Armies of Japan Return From War.

EMPEROR WILL GIVE THANKS

But Wants Armies of Oyama and Kodama to First Return—Will Then Repair to Temple of Ise and Give Thanks to Imperial Ancestors.

Victoria, Nov. 29.—Troops were arriving daily at Tokio when the Iyo Maru sailed.

Field Marshal Oyama and General Kodama were expected shortly, having been ordered to Tokio by the emperor, before he proceeded to the Temple of Ise to give thanks to the imperial ancestors for victory.

The Iyo Maru brought news that a group of famous Japanese wrestlers including the noted Komidori and Kungatake, who have made a successful tour of Corea and China, will shortly start on an American tour. They will leave for San Francisco shortly.

A number of members of the Japanese diet have been arrested at Tokio, in connection with the anti-peace disturbances.

A Pekin dispatch to the Tokio Asahi says an agreement has been made by the governor of Shantung province with the German governor general of Kiao Chou, for the withdrawal of German troops from Shantung. The evacuation is to be complete in six months, when China will purchase the German barracks at Kiao Chou.

The Japanese squadron to visit England will consist of the cruisers Asama, Tokiwa, Chitso, and Kasagi.

The Toyo Kisen Kaisha's service between Japan and South America will be commenced on December 6, when the steamer Glenfarg will leave Yokohama for Callao.

A copyright treaty between Japan and the United States was signed at Tokio on November 11.

The Nippon Yusen Aisha line is arranging for more frequent services on its American-Australian and European lines.

**BOX FACTORY BURNS.**

Disastrous Fire at San Francisco Entails Loss of Hundred Thousand.

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—A disastrous fire broke out early this morning in the cigar manufacturing establishment of Ellis & Gautadine at 224 Fremont street, and before the fire department got the flames under control property valued at \$100,000 was consumed.

Among the places completely destroyed were Union Iron Works, at 222 Fremont street; Reliance Engine Company, 226 Fremont; Ellis-Gautadine Cigar Box Manufacturers, 224 Fremont, and the Jardine Machine Works, at 218 Fremont. Heavy loss was also sustained by the V. Kingwell Brass foundry at 228 Fremont street and the Betts Spring Company at 216 Fremont street.

The losses will probably reach fully \$100,000.

Most of the property is insured.
