Portland, Nov. 30.—Hops are considered firm as present quotations, under stress of inquiry on the part of brewers.

"Brewers realize that the bottom has been struck in the Oregon hop market," said McKinley Mitchell today, "and they have become anxious to buy."

Grower who have refused to sell at the very low prices offered are not by any means anxious to let go at the increased offers, but are likely to hold on until a few cents higher is reached.

In the opinion of some dealers, better prices will prevail before the season has passed, but these dealers do not look for high prices. They indicate that 12c or possibly 14c, may rule before the entire crop of Oregon has been disposed of.
