Regular December Meeting Held Last Night.

1906 RATES SAME AS 1905

The Water Commission of the city of Astoria, met in regular session at the board rooms in the City Hall at 7:30 o'clock last evening, at which time and place there were present, President Charles Wright, and Directors Bowlby, Trenchard, Elmort, Brix, Van Dusen and Clerk Lounsberry with Engineer
