German Steamship Nunantia For Far Japan.

WORD FROM THE ROANOKE

Yesterday's Budget of Waterfront News, Garnered in the Rain—Craft Coming and Going and the Men Who are in Command.

San Francisco, Dec. 2.—After a dangerous voyage from Portland, during which she was disabled off Eureka bar, and afterwards tossed about in the heavy seas off the California coast, the steamship Roanoke is expected to arrive at San Francisco about 4 o'clock this afternoon.

When sighted the Roanoke was making slow time, about 5 1/2 knots an hour, but was not in distress. Tugboats will assist her if assistance is required.

Late—The Roanoke arrived inside San Francisco harbor at 2:15 o'clock, and proceeded at once to discharge her passengers.

The steamer Roanoke, which was disabled several days ago on Humboldt bar and for the safety of which widespread anxiety has been felt, arrived safely this afternoon, with her passengers all well.

The barkentine Tropic Bird, from San Francisco crossed in late yesterday afternoon, from San Francisco, and was brought to her anchorage in the city channel by the Wallula.

The master of the Tropic Bird reported four ailing craft and one big steamer hull down on the horizon, when he made the bar, but they had not shown up at sundown.

JUSTICE GOODMAN'S DOCKET.

Three Cases Handled There Yesterday Afternoon.

Martin Stanovich, charged with assault and battery, was fined by Judge Goodman yesterday in the sum of \$8, a mild fine levied with a view to certain mitigating features of the case; but, despite the leniency of the court, Stanovich filed an oral plea of appeal and will take it to the circuit court for review.

The Japanese, Miki, who was charged with kidnapping a young Japanese girl from the home of Mrs. Swartz, in Uppertown, was arraigned in Judge Goodman's court yesterday afternoon and entered a plea of "not guilty" and secured his temporary release, pending investigation by the circuit court, upon cash bail in the sum of \$250, which was promptly furnished by one of the many countrymen that flocked about him in the court room.

A complaint charging Frank Handoe with assault and battery upon Victor Bergman was filed in Justice Goodman's court, yesterday morning, and upon sufficient guaranty in way of bail, he was released, for appearance and trial tomorrow at 2 o'clock p. m.
