

BOSTONIANS SORE

Want the Warship Constitution Preserved.

MIGHT BE USED AS TARGET

Secretary Bonaparte Suggests That Use for "Old Ironsides" But New Englanders Insist That Is Not in Touch With the Situation.

Boston, Dec. 6.—Boston is grieving over Secretary Bonaparte's suggestion in his annual report that the old warship Constitution might be used as a target. Opinions are unanimous that Secretary Bonaparte is not in touch with the feeling of New England toward the historic frigate. John D. Long, former Secretary of the Navy said: "I am surprised that he exhibits so much feeling against 'Old Ironsides.' The Constitution has a national significance. So long as a plank remains, it ought to be held in reverence and preserved. Mr. Bonaparte can have no idea how many people visit it, and what a stimulus it is in patriotic education. I sincerely trust that he may modify his views."

President Eliot of Harvard said: "Let the Constitution stay where she is and as she is."

Charles Francis Adams said: "The report strikes me very unfavorably indeed. It is simply brutal. I am astonished at such a thing."

SEARCH FOR ASSETS.

New York, Dec. 6.—Search for the assets of the Franklin syndicate has been concluded and within the next few days creditors of the 520 per cent swindle of which William H. Miller was the organizer, will know how much they can recover. John B. Lord, trustee for the creditors, has filed his final report with the U. S. District Court of Brooklyn, and yesterday Judge Thomas ordered it placed in the hands of referee in Bankruptcy, Robert F. Tillney, who has set December 13 for the hearing. About 145 per cent of the claims have been recovered.

AMENDMENT MADE PUBLIC.

New York, Dec. 6.—The board of trade and transportation of this city has made public the provisions of its amended bill for the regulation of railroad rates. When the original bill was drafted by this organization last March it was criticized on the ground that it would punish the innocent competing roads as well as the rebating roads. The drafters of the measure believe they have overcome this objection by giving law-abiding competing roads the right to begin an action against roads whose violations result in the lowering of the maximum tariff.

URGES OPENING OF MANCHURIA

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 6.—United States Minister Rockhill is engaged in urging the opening of Manchuria by China, but the Chinese foreign board says it has not decided upon the program for the province. Chinese officials are reported to be troubled over the Japanese attitude regarding Manchuria, Japan having shown a desire to monopolize the commercial and other rights in Manchuria. As an intatory step in this respect, the Japanese have sent many parties of experts to investigate the natural resources of the Manchurian provinces.

SAYS WAR WILL COME

Chaffee Says Ours is One of Nations of Earth.

HOME INDUSTRIES TO DEFEND

When it Comes Country Must Be Intelligently Prepared for it—Scientific and Well Framed Men are Needed to Command the Troops.

Chicago, Dec. 6.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Los Angeles says: At a reception in his honor, last night Lieutenant General and Chief of Staff Adna R. Chaffee of the U. S. army predicted that the U. S. will again go to war. This prediction was made in General Chaffee's address regarding the work of the army. He said: "Gentlemen, war will come again. There are plenty of men in this room who will see our country at war again. Not on our own soil, perhaps; you must remember that we have now become one of the nations of the earth. We have great interests to defend. When that war comes we must be intelligently prepared for it. Modern war is not what war used to be. No one is now fitted to command troops who is not a scientific and well trained man. Modern war must be scientifically treated to save human life. The Japanese are a military people, but we are not. We do not get on with military preparations as they do, but we should be ready for conflicts."

TERROR OF STORMS.

New York, Dec. 6.—The steamship Gerty of the Austro-American line from Venice, Trieste, Messina and Palermo, arrived yesterday with 719 immigrants who told a story of a five weeks' voyage through storms and terrors which none cared to experience again. For the better part of a month they were shut between decks because of rough weather. They had been frightened into at least one panic, a woman had gone insane from terror, her fellow passengers said; five had started down in the engine space at night, the ship had been in total darkness, the drinking water got salty, a passenger was choked and robbed, and death had claimed three victims during the five weeks' trip. The deaths were those of a mother and her new born infant, and a boy of 10 who died of meningitis.
