AT COUNCIL'S NEXT SESSION

Mayor, City Attorney, Auditor, Ways and Means Committee, and Special Committee, Have Prepared Statement for Next Year,

Friday evening the mayor, city, atways and means committee, and the -pecial committee appointed at the last meeting of the council, met and made an estimate of the expenses of the city council for consideration at the adjourned meeting of that body next Thursday night.

The report will recommend the making of tax levies as follows: Municipal mill; and a special levy to make up the deficiency in receipts, of seven mills. This makes a total of 18 mills. Accordhe stores will remain open every night ing to the estimates, the expenses will be about \$5000 less than this year, amounting to \$50,770.

To bring about this reduction, the report figures on cutting down the expenses of the fire department through not buying any new apparatus, reducing the appropriation to the public property committee on repairs, and in taking two men off the police force.
