

PLACED IN VAULT

Mrs. Rogers Body Interred at Hoosic Falls.

IN PRESENCE OF THE FAMILY

To Avoid Crowd, Body Taken from Train at Hoosic and Then Driven to Cemetery and Placed in Vault—An Armed Guard Stationed at Vault.

Hoosic Falls, N. Y., Dec. 9.—The body of Mary Mabel Rogers, who was executed at Windsor, Vt., yesterday, was placed in a vault at St. Mary's cemetery here early today, preparatory to the interment in the presence of the family at 6 o'clock this morning. It had been generally supposed that the body would be brought over the Boston & Maine railroad to the station here last night and several hundred persons had gathered at the depot. To avoid the crowd, friends of the Rogers family appealed to the railroad officials to have the train stopped at Hoosic. This was done and the body removed from the baggage car at that station where it was taken in charge by the undertakers. The casket was placed in a wagon and drove to the cemetery.

It had been planned to make an immediate interment, but at the last moment this plan was abandoned and the body placed in a vault to remain there until interment at 6 o'clock when the wish of the relatives and friends for a final opening of the casket was granted. Meantime the vault was secured and an armed guard remained in charge. Awaiting the funeral party at the cemetery were Rev. Francis A. McCrane, Katharine Callahan and a sister of the dead woman, a brother Louis, and a few intimate friends of the family.

LEADER ARRIVES

Russian Revolutionary is Visiting in New York City.

MISSION TO COLLECT FUNDS

He Says that Government Is Unable to Detect Them—Arrests Made Now and Then—One Hundred Members in the Bund.

New York, Dec. 9.—Moysey Gourevich, one of the leaders of the revolutionary organization in Russia, known as the Bund, has just arrived in this city from that country, where he was recently released from prison, after serving two years for his revolutionary tendencies. His mission in this country, he said, yesterday, is to collect funds for the cause from the sympathizers of the Bund. To that end Mr. Gourevich announced that he would make a trip through the United States. He said:

"The revolutionists have established a perfect underground government and notwithstanding the vigilance of the authorities, we are enabled to carry on our work without detection or hindrance. Of course, now and then one of our members is arrested.

"There are about 100,000 members of the Bund in Russia and double that number are associated with us. We publish our proclamation and circulate them, despite the long search which the government has made for our presses. To circulate our proclamations we employ women, who conceal them about their persons and carry them from place to place.

"Our movement has made such progress as the most sanguine revolutionist would not have hoped for a year ago. We have forced concessions from the government that were never thought possible. But the revolution has only begun."

The relief fund was increased yesterday by \$21,524, which brings the total of the second million dollar fund up to \$97,504.
